

HAS NOT SEEN SEN. BOURNE BUT ONCE IN PAST 2 YEARS

Oswald West Shows Idiocy of Assembly Ticketers' Claim That There is a "Bourne-Chamberlain" Combine—Corporation Lawyer's Leaders Are Scared.

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 20.—"I hope Senator Bourne is supporting me. I want every vote I can get. All I know about Mr. Bourne's attitude is what I read in the newspapers," said Oswald West in a speech here Tuesday. "I have seen Senator Bourne but once in over two years, and that was when I met with the Oregon delegation in Secretary Ballinger's office in Washington about the first of this year with reference to the Siletz matter. Senator Bourne never asked me for a favor in his life, and I have never asked one of him. I have received no word from him by letter or otherwise, directly or indirectly about my candidacy or this campaign."

"Not one of his friends or supporters has come to me, with offers of support or for exaction of promises in the event of my election. "If, as the papers say, Mr. Bourne and his friends are with me, I assure them that they and the many other Republicans who are with me in this fight will be given a square deal, no more, no less. That is all they have a right to expect, and it is all they do expect."

"As to Senator Chamberlain and myself I am glad to say that we are intimate friends, and it is a friendship of which I am proud. I was his friend when he was a candidate, and put forth every effort to elect him, and because I am his friend and because he has rich red blood in his veins, he is standing by me today. It is not because he expects anything in return, but because he is the kind of man that never deserts a friend. Should the editor of the Oregonian and the editors of all the assembly papers in Oregon offer to support me on condition that I would repudiate George E. Chamberlain; should every delegate to the assembly offer me support if I would renounce George Chamberlain; should my distinguished opponent, Mr. Bowerman, come to me, offer to withdraw and thereby tender me the governorship on a silver platter if I would renounce my friendship for George E. Chamberlain, I would say to them all, "Gentlemen, I would a thousand times rather go down to defeat with George Chamberlain's friendship than to victory without it."

"I am not a quitter," concluded Mr. West. "I do not start out with my friends and then throw them overboard to save my own bacon, as Mr. Bowerman did when he attempted to flop and ditch his assembly friends by bidding for the support of the anti-assembly forces."

Enthusiastic Meeting. A round of enthusiastic applause greeted Mr. West's utterance. It was an incident in the biggest and most enthusiastic rally that has occurred in Pendleton during the present campaign.

Five hundred people of the city and the surrounding country gathered at the meeting place to hear the direct primary and Statement No. 1 candidate for governor tell of his position and discuss the issues of the campaign.
