

## Central Point Items

Rev. Clarence True Wilson, of Portland, representing the Oregon Anti-Saloon league, addressed a large audience in the opera house Tuesday evening. Dr. Wilson is making a canvass of Oregon for state wide prohibition and is a fluent talker. He is something of an anomaly in the way of a prohibitionist, in that he is a strong opponent of equal suffrage, as may be seen from an extract from one of his speeches which appears in another column as a paid advertisement from the Oregon state association opposed to the extension of suffrage to women. The rank and file of Oregon's women temperance workers can hardly agree with Dr. Wilson in his views on taxation without representation.

Mayor Leever and Recorder Jacobs went to Medford Saturday morning to interview the officials of the Rogue River Electric company regarding a rate for electric current for power at the water pumping station. While no definite agreement was arrived at it is understood that the company is disposed to be fair in the matter and that they will either stay with the rate offered by them last spring or that an arrangement will be made for installing a meter on a basis that they give the city a cheaper service taking the year through.

It is urged by some of the town officials that during the winter season only a small amount of water will be required as compared with the summer season when sprinkling and irrigation will make heavy demands on the supply and that a saving can be made by installing the meter system. It is expected that

the matter will be settled satisfactorily to all parties concerned within a few days.
