LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 22.—Four firemen are suffering from injuries today sustained while fighting a fire that threatened to destroy the Newmark building on South Broadway. It is believed all will recover.

The fire started on the sixth floor of the building, occupied by the salesroom of the Parmlee Manufacturing company, and spread through the sixth, fifth and fourth floors before it was checked. The loss will be less than \$100,000.

TO SET DEFINITE DATE FOR NEW RATES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—The interstate commerce commission today has under consideration the question of setting a definite date when the rates on the so-called mountain and east carriers will go into effect.

Attorney Seth Mann, for the traffic bureau of the San Francisco Merchants' Exchange, made the argument before the commission for the reduction. Mann was opposed by Judge Barine of the Nevada commission, plaintiffs in the east and west-bound rate case.
