

PORTLAND AIDS IRELANDS CAUSE

T. P. O'Connor Gains Material Assistance in Oregon Metropolis for Old Erin's Cause—Is Enthusiastically Greeted.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 24.—Approximately \$7,000 was collected in Portland yesterday for the Irish parliamentary party at the Portland theater after T. P. O'Connor, the noted Irish leader, told the story of the English sovereignty over Ireland and appealed to his audience to aid him in securing home rule for the famed island.

LITTLE CHANGE IN CATTLE MARKET

PORTLAND, Oct. 24.—Receipts on this market for the past week are as follows: Cattle, 1,776; calves, 163; hogs, 3,290; goats, 243; sheep, 1,340 and horses and mules, 58.

The cattle market remains the same as last week's quotations, there being no appreciable change in prices or quality. The receipts have been liberal and have consisted mostly of medium grade stuff. As a whole cows have been of a slightly better grade than heretofore, the market being firm on all tops. Veal calves are in good demand, especially the lighter grades.

The hog market is in a very unsettled condition, buyers are still demanding lower prices, but the scarcity of supplies has made it more difficult than they predicted to break the market. Hogs opened Monday at \$9.75 and are selling today at \$9.60, and weak at that.

Receipts in sheep have been light but the quality good. Market is firm with a tendency for higher prices for the better grades. Goats on this market for \$2.50 this week.
