

TRACE FOUND OF MISSING BALLOON

Belated Advice State That America II Probably Is Safe—Is Seen in Entirely Different Location From Where Sought.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 24.—Belated advice that the balloon America II, which sailed in the international race, probably is safe, reached here today.

This would bring the balloon in an entirely different locality from that in which it is being sought.

Aero club officials hope that the American II, with Allan Hawley, its pilot, and Augustus Post, aide, are safe.

The telegram giving details of the American II was received by President Lambert of the Aero club. It was from Thompsonville, and read as follows:

"America II passed here Tuesday headed due north. Farmers asked us to report these facts. Balloon passed West St. Ignace, Mich. Talked over Sutton's Bay, at dark. Just over with people eight miles north of here who saw lettering on the balloon. (Signed.) E. S. Northrup.

Unless the America has gone further, the German balloon, Dusseldorf II won the international balloon race and the Gordon Bennett cup, according to an announcement of the officials of the Aero club of America, which promoted the race, here today.

The Dusseldorf is also credited with a new world's record, having sailed 1,240 miles as the crew flies from the starting point at St. Louis. The former record was 1,123 miles. The Dusseldorf landed at Kiskissing, Quebec.

TO FIGHT HARD FOR JOHN DIETZ

Children Appeal for Aid and Response Is Prompt—Dietz Relief Committee Is Formed and Hard Fight Will Be Waged.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Oct. 24.—Still wearing bandages over the wounds they received at the hands of deputies in the stubborn defense of his cabin at Cameron Dam a week ago, Myra Dietz and Clarence Dietz, children of John Dietz, the defender of the cabin, arrived here today to raise funds for the defense of their father, mother and brother, who are charged with the murder of Deputy Sheriff Oscar Harp. Harp was shot during the fighting around the Dietz cabin.

The appeal of the Dietz children met with instantaneous response and a Dietz defense committee was speedily formed. Simultaneously with their arrival came the news that the lumber camp, whose quarrel with Dietz lies behind the affair, had sent laborers to cut the Cameron dam.

The Dietz committee intends to incorporate and fight the prosecution of Dietz stubbornly.

Sympathy for Myra Dietz, who was shot from ambush by a bullet intended for her father, is causing a great flow of support for her father's cause.

The action of the lumber company in rushing the work it was unable to do while Dietz was at liberty also is working in Dietz favor. The company will be enjoined from proceeding until the trial of Dietz is concluded, according to the defense committee.

ORDINANCE NO. 307 An ordinance declaring the cost of improvement of South Laurel street from West Main street to West 11th street, and assessing the property benefited, thereby, and declaring such assessment, and directing the entry thereof in the docket of city liens.

THE CITY OF MEDFORD DOTH ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: Section 1. That no protest having been filed against the improvement of South Laurel street from West Main street to West 11th street, notice of the intention of the council to cause such improvement to be made, having been given, and said improvements having been ordered made, the council has considered the matter and herewith ascertains the probable cost of making such improvement to be the sum of \$9437.75.

And said council further finds that the special and peculiar benefit accruing upon each lot or part thereof adjacent to said improvement, and is just proportion to benefits, to be the respective amounts hereinafter set opposite the number or description of such lot or part thereof, and such amounts respectively are hereby declared to be the proportionate share of each lot or part thereof, and the cost of such improvement, and is hereby declared to be assessed against said lot or parcel respectively, the name appearing above each description, being the name of the owner of such lot or parcel.
