NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Ted Coy, the famous Yale player, writing in the New York World today, gives the following prediction on the outcome of the football season in the eastern universities:

BACON SOARS; TOO MUCH PROSPERITY

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—"There's too much prosperity," said the leading packers early today, and shortly afterwards the price of bacon soared to 46 cents per pound.

"The people want the best and are willing to pay for it," said one packer. "There is a shortage of fancy hogs and it is fancy hogs that make fancy bacon. The demand is now for fancy hogs, so why shouldn't the prices rise?"

STOCK MARKET STRONG

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—The mixed gains by the stocks at the opening today failed to throw much light on the trend of speculative sentiment. United States Steel opened unchanged, Union Pacific was down 1/4 and Reading up 3/8. Pennsylvania rose 1/8 and General Electric 1/8. Large buying orders were distributed in the important stocks and there was a sharp rally, which ran to over a point in Union Pacific and American Smelting. United States Steel rose to 79 7/8, the highest price of the present movement.

The tone was heavy and dull at noon. Bonds were steady.
