

APPLE TRADE DULL WITH SALES SLOW

Northwestern Fruit Exchange Reports It Difficult to Interest Buyers in Northwestern Apples Just Now.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange reports the apple situation to the Journal as follows:

The market is dull and featureless. We are finding it very difficult to interest the trade in Jonathans and similar soft varieties, as the demand seems to be altogether for hard winter varieties such as Wineaps, Ganos, etc. Most of the trade seems to have covered their requirements for Jonathans and concessions in price will have to be made to dispose of the surplus promptly.

UP, UP, UP, EVER UP, SOARS BACON

Latest Hoist Comes in the Face of a Steady Decline in the Price of Hogs and of Feeds for Porkers—Retailers Now Selling at 40 Cents.

CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—To all appearances the high price of salt meats, the highest in ten years, is here to stay for some time, probably several months. Following the general elevation of pork and pork products to a point which is the highest ever reached in times of peace, the packers today insist that they cannot secure enough hogs to supply the demand; that they are losing money because porkers are not being received fast enough in the stockyards. Fancy bacon cost Chicagoans 40 cents per pound today. The usual high grade bacon retails for 35 cents per pound sliced. The least that the housewife can purchase this grade for is at 33 1-3 cents per pound, provided she will slice it herself.

The odd thing about this latest hoist at the selling end of the packing concerns is that the raise was made in the face of a steady decline in the price of hogs and of corn on which the porkers are fattened. A resume of the market report at the time of prices skyrocketing showed that the demand for live hogs was weak and that they are left standing in the pens daily with comparatively no takers. It showed also that the price paid for live hogs was lower by nearly \$2.50 per hundred weight than it was six months ago when no retailer would have considered asking 35 and 40 cents a pound for bacon. The corn fed hogs last year cost 59 1-8 cents. Yesterday the market closed at 45 5-8 cents.
