JAPAN TO WORK OUT A TARIFF

Question of Trade Relations Is Growing Acute in Nippon—Jap Ship of State Approaches Shoal Waters Rapidly.

TOKIO, Oct. 26.—Tariff revision will be one of the principal questions before the approaching Japanese diet, according to Premier Katsura. The question of trade relations with foreign countries, particularly the United States and England, is one of growing gravity with Japan.

The possibilities of retaliation by the United States and England are great and Japanese statesmen realize that the ship of state is approaching shoal waters.

UNIVERSITY TO SELL WASHINGTON LANDS

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 26.—The faculty, students and alumni of the University of Washington are aroused over the possibility of the sale of the University of Washington lands in Douglas county. The sale will be taken up by the board of regents this week and those interested in the conserving of the university lands will endeavor to prevail on the regents to retain the lands. The purpose has been to open the 34,000 acres to settlers, but this has been deemed impracticable, as supervision by the regents is almost impossible. All the lands of the university in the eastern part of the state are now worth approximately \$3,000,000.

NO JURY YET TO TRY MRS. KERSCH

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 26.—The jury that is to try Mrs. Carrie Kersch for complicity in the murder of William A. Johnson was not completed this morning when court reconvened.

When the court adjourned yesterday there were 12 men in the jury box who had been examined and passed, but neither the state nor defense had exercised any of its peremptory challenges.

When the examination of prospective jurors was taken up today it was predicted that the jury would not be ready to hear evidence in the case until this afternoon.

HEINZE SURRENDERS AND BEGINS SHORT SENTENCE

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—Arthur P. Heinze today surrendered to United States Marshal Henkel following the decision of the supreme court of the United States upholding a ruling of the United States circuit court at New York that he was in contempt because he paid a federal grand jury witness to leave the country.

Heinze was taken to the Tombs and began serving his brief sentence. Henkel refused to allow his prisoner to ride in a taxicab and made him walk to the forbidden portal of the prison.

As he entered the Tombs Heinze remarked: "Well, there's one satisfaction—I'll be out in time to vote."

shippers to save their shipping receipts, as the courts would undoubtedly sustain the reductions ordered. He explained the financial operations whereby the Southern Pacific was enabled to appear as a losing venture instead of the most profitable railroad in the country.

"I ask you to compare my record with that of my opponent," he said. "On everything Medford and Southern Oregon has asked I have gone down the line for you. I helped your delegations in the legislature on your Crater Lake road, your Normal school, your Rogue river fish bills. I have improved your train service and given you lower express and freight rates, and if elected governor I shall continue to do what I can for Southern Oregon, for you are all good friends of mine. But what has Mr. Bowerman done for you, except to kill your Normal school?"

Mr. West made a brief speech at Jacksonville at 3 o'clock and was given a hearty welcome. He left for Grants Pass on the law motor, speaking there Tuesday evening and Roseburg Wednesday.
