

APPLE QUEEN IS CHOSEN SPOKANE

Idelle, the First Chosen From Among Fairest Maidens of Northwest, Will Be Crowned on November 14 at Apple Show.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 27.—Idelle the First, chosen from among the fairest maidens in the northwest, will be proclaimed queen of the Apple Empire at the third annual national competitive exposition in Spokane the evening of November 14, the coronation ceremonies taking place in the throne room on the stage at the state armory at 8 o'clock. Afterward Her Royal Majesty and suite will make a tour of the grounds, inspecting the displays of 2,000,000 apples from districts in Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Montana, British Columbia and other parts of America.

Queen Idelle will be attended by the prime minister, counselors, courtiers and ladies, pages, flower girls, heralds and guards. The coronation will take on all the pomp and ceremony of olden days, and a royal proclamation will be issued, to be read by the prime minister, bidding the loyal subjects from the highland, the valleys and distant parts of the orchard domain to join in the third annual festival in honor of King Apple.

Following the playing of the introduction to Meyerbeer's "Coronation March" by the National Apple Show band of 50 pieces, under the direction of Professor A. G. Reemer, the arrival of Idelle the First and her retinue will be heralded by a fanfare of trumpets and the party will proceed to the throne room to the strains of the "Coronation March." The ceremony is open to the public.

Among the features will be a stately minuet, danced by four boys in court costume and powdered wigs and four girls in gowns of the period and patches. There will also be music by the military band and the Elks' quartet will sing selections arranged for the occasion. Queen Idelle will also hold a reception for the school children the afternoon of November 15.

PHILIPPINE TRIBES MURDER COUPLE

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 27.—According to dispatches received in Seattle today, the Philippine tribes have murdered Earl V. Geer and his wife, both well known in this city. Mr. Geer last summer married a Seattle girl, Miss Vasil Crocker, and they sailed December 22 for the Philippines. G. R. Ford, treasurer of the Geer company, who has been in communication with Davao, has received no word of the safety of the couple.

Geer came to Seattle from Oregon a year ago. He was a relative of former Governor Geer of Oregon. He was 25 years old.

RANCHMAN KILLED IN AUTOMOBILE WRECK

THE DALLES, Or., Oct. 27.—Henry Meyers, a wealthy ranchman, is dead and his brother, Julius Meyers, capitalist, is in a local hospital today with a broken rib and several minor injuries as a result of an automobile smashup on Ninth street last night.

The brothers were on their way to Henry Meyers' ranch when the machine got beyond the control of Julius, who was driving it, and crashed into a rockpile. Both men were crushed under the machine when it overturned. Henry died soon after being taken from beneath the car.
