## WEST TO CARRY LANE COUNTY

Assembly Issue Dead and the Corpse Has Not Been Buried—Voters Now Prepare for the Funeral, Which Will Be Most Complete.

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 29.—Oswald West, direct primary, anti-assembly and State-ment No. 1 candidate for governor, will carry Lane county, that ancient stronghold of rockribbed republicanism, by a plurality as that given George E. Chamberlain in 1906, and that means 500 votes or more.

The vast bulk of Lane county's republicans do not love L. E. Bean and Bean's county assembly, and they do not love Jay Bowerman or Jay Bowerman's state assembly. Assembly organs and assembly orators, shouting loudly, say that, "As Lane county goes, so goes the state, and old Lane has a normal republican majority of 1200 votes." So far they paint a picture true to life. But they go farther yet, and here they stumble and fall. "The assembly is dead in Lane county," they say. "The voters there have forgotten the assembly, have buried their differences and are supporting Bowerman to a man," and here they start out with the flag and finish lame.

The assembly is dead in Lane county, but it is not forgotten, and the corpse, left lying in state too long, has not been buried. The republican voters of Lane county are preparing for the funeral. Maybe the assembly leaders of the Bowerman headquarters in Portland have not heard of the "Lane County Direct Primary Anti-Assembly club," which has its headquarters at Eugene.

## 27 WITNESSES IN TIMES CASE

Grand Jury in Los Angeles Summons Many Men From Bay Region—Investigation Will Be Most Complete—Prisco Chief Is Quiescent.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29.—Twenty-seven witnesses summoned from counties about the San Francisco bay will leave today and tomorrow for Los Angeles to testify before the special grand jury called to investigate the explosion and burning of the Los Angeles Times. The service of the subpoenas has been completed and it is likely the grand jury will resume its hearing Monday.

Eight of the 27 witnesses were summoned from San Francisco. Others were from Oakland, Berkeley, Giant, Port Costa and Sausalito. The service of the subpoenas was accomplished without any further hitch between Chief of Police Seymour and Attorney Earl Rogers. The writs were handed entirely by detectives from Los Angeles.

## CANDIDATE DIX FLAYS ROOSEVELT

Says That If the Political House Is to Be Cleansed It Must Be Done According to T. R.'s Personal Methods and by His Friends.

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—In a copyrighted article in the New York Evening Post today, John A. Dix, democratic candidate for governor of New York, flays Theodore Roosevelt.

"Had Roosevelt known that the governor would attempt to put the republican house in order," the article says, "The Alids trial and the insurance scandals would have been impossible. What we see today is the Saratoga nominator, the ardent preacher of pure politics, associating with such purifiers as Collins, Hendricks and Aldridge. Roosevelt is reiterating the same old appeal, if the political house be cleansed thoroughly it must be according to his personal methods and done by his friends. The public has not forgotten the promises Roosevelt made 12 years ago and what has happened in the meantime."

## OFFICE OF MAYOR IN SALEM BEGGING

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 29.—Salem is without mayoralty candidates and the office promises to go begging at the coming primary election. Apparently nobody wants to be chief executive of the Beaver capital. Citizens of the city are much wrought up in consequence, as the city primaries occur next week.

The campaign Salem is about to enter upon for a supply of mountain water is the reason for the lack of aspirants for office. Many oppose the scheme, believing the water of the Willamette river can be filtered and used in the city mains. On the other hand, it is urged that if Salem is to keep the capital, it must secure a pure water supply, since the city has had difficulties in the past in this regard and epidemics resulted. This is largely the reason prominent citizens are sidestepping the mayoralty. It is held that the work involved in straightening out the water situation outweighs the honor of the position, since there is no salary attached to the office.

## CALIFORNIA JUSTICES CAN'T GET SALARIES

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 29.—The seven justices of the state supreme court—W. H. Beatty, F. M. Angellotti, Lucian Shaw, F. W. Henshaw, H. A. Melvin, W. G. Lorigan and M. C. Sloss—have not drawn their salaries for the past year, leaving \$56,000 idle in the state treasury. The reason given for the failure of each member to receive his \$8000 is because he cannot make affidavit that there is no case before him which has remained undecided for more than 90 days from the time it was submitted.

The bribery case of Abo Ruef, now on appeal, is believed to be the obstacle in the way of the judges getting their pay. In the meantime the money can be loaned out at interest by the state treasurer, thereby earning the state \$1020 to date.

## STEAMER CALLS FOR TUGS BY WIRELESS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29.—After pounding on the shore off Point Reyes for several hours last night, the schooner Charles Nelson limped into port today, little the worse for wear. Captain L. C. Hansen reported all safe on board and very little of his cargo of lumber lost.

Wireless calls for aid received last night led to the belief that the schooner, with her crew of 30 men, were in danger of sinking, and early today the tug Sea Lark was sent to her aid. The Nelson floated off at high tide, however, after some of the cargo was thrown overboard, and came into port under her own steam. No news has been received from Point Arena, where another vessel was reported ashore at about the same time the Nelson went aground.
