HALE TO BUILD NEW WAREHOUSE

Increased Business Causes Popular Piano Man to Consider Plans for a Big Warehouse of Corner of Oakdale and Tenth Streets.

J. F. Hale states that he will commence to plan for a big warehouse to occupy the lot now occupied by the warehouse built this spring. "The piano business has increased so rapidly," says Mr. Hale, "that I am compelled to sell the present warehouse at the corner of Tenth and Oakdale and as soon as possible I will build a warehouse 25 by 50 feet with full size basement and two stories above ground. The new warehouse will be fitted with a freight elevator and arranged so as to display a large number of pianos at one time."

VOTERS DON'T GET PAMPHLETS

SALEM, Or., Oct. 29.—There are at least 521 voters in the state who will not receive pamphlets under the corrupt practices act, regardless of the fact that they are duly registered. Notifications have been received at the secretary of state's office from various postoffices throughout Oregon which show that there are that many pamphlets being held by the postmasters because the voters in registering failed to give their proper address so that the mail would be forwarded to the right destination.

In Falls City alone there are 78 pamphlets lying in the postoffice undelivered and unclaimed. For some complaints have been received from Marion and Multnomah counties that pamphlets have not reached certain voters who registered some time ago. The law provides that pamphlets shall be sent to the outlying counties first and that counties closer to the state capital shall be served last.

THREE BIG PRIZES FOR APPLE GROWERS

Three prizes totaling \$850 in cash and carrying with them solid silver medals have recently been added to the premium list of the Oregon apple show to be given by the Oregon Horticultural society at their 25th annual meeting, November 30 and December 1 and 2. These prizes are known as the sweepstake prizes, the Louis W. Hill, Great Northern Railway prize and the Northern Pacific railway prize.

The sweepstake prize is open to any district west of the Rocky mountains. The prize goes to the district showing the largest and best collection of apples. This prize can be competed for by any commercial organization, grange, fruitgrowers' association, county or any other organization of fruit growers. The prize is \$350.

The Louis W. Hill, or Great Northern trophy, is \$250 and is open to any territory tributary to the Great Northern lines in the north-west. The Northern Pacific is also a prize of \$250 and covers apples grown in territory tributary to its lines.

STRAWBERRIES IN NOVEMBER

Mr. Stevens states that his vines have yielded almost continuously since April and are still full of bloom and berries. He has sold over \$300 worth of strawberries from less than a quarter of an acre at prices ranging from 10 cents to 15 cents a box, and found market for an unlimited supply.

WANT COURSE IN APPLE PACKING

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 29.—Agricultural colleges, experiment stations and all other institutions in the Pacific and northwestern states teaching horticulture, will be urged by the trustees of the National Apple Show, Inc., to add a course in apple packing as soon as possible. This is with a view of relieving the shortage of competent help all over the box group, including Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, California, Colorado, New Mexico and Utah, where much fruit will not be packed this year.
