TACOMA TO BUILD MUNICIPAL DOCK

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 31.—When the municipal commission meets in session Wednesday it will make definite plans for the beginning of actual construction work of a municipal dock for Tacoma as authorized by the bond election Saturday. Mayor Fawcett announced today that an ordinance probably will be passed calling for bids for the remodeling of the Alaska-Pacific Steamship company's dock to be used as a temporary landing place for sound steamers. An overhead walk will be built from the waterfront to A street, which will land the passengers in the heart of the business district. The cost of the temporary arrangements will be in the neighborhood of \$15,000, while the permanent dock which will be of concrete will cost about \$150,000.

POLICE SEARCH FOR MAN WHO SEIZED GIRL

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 31.—In possession of a good description of a man who seized 14-year-old Marjorie Brown after driving away two boys and a girl, her companions, at the point of a revolver, the police today are searching for the assailant. They believe he will prove to be the man who has attacked several women in the East Lake district during the last two months. Costly Picture Stolen

BERKELEY, Oct. 31.—A \$10,000 painting cut from its frame in the art gallery of Herbert Oldfield of this city is being sought today by the police in the towns surrounding San Francisco bay. The theft was discovered early today when Oldfield, entering his studio, found the transom above the front door broken and the picture gone.

The painting, the "Three Sisters," by Alfred Dulemeau was procured by Oldfield in San Francisco shortly after the fire of 1906, in which it was slightly damaged. It was said to be valued at \$10,000.

WHITE SLAYERS GET THREE YEARS EACH

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 31.—Sentencing George A. Pearce and William Bellman, convicted white slavers, to three years' imprisonment at San Quentin today, Judge Dunne sharply arraigned the attorney representing Bellman and accused the juvenile court of incompetency.

"I want you to understand," said the court, "that I have no illusion about these young men. You know perhaps, as I know, that they are the least of the offenders in cases of this kind. Behind them is a very vicious system, and it is this system I would like to have reached. It is the people who compose the system and make it possible who ought to be punished. If the juvenile court had any officers connected with it who knew their business perhaps we might have had the representatives of the system here and perhaps we might be trying these young men."

"It would seem that San Francisco is a kind of clearing house for the purpose of furnishing the interior towns of the state and along the coast with women, and it is an awful thing to contemplate."

Addressing Bellman and Attorney John Williams, Judge Dunne said: "I think these people ought to be punished—not as severely, perhaps, as the people who hired Bellman and attorney to come here. They are the real criminals."
