

APPLE MARKET UNSATISFACTORY

Demand for Spitzenbergs and High-Price Varieties Unsatisfactory—On Other Hand, Medium Varieties Are Wanted by Buyers in East.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange in its latest market bulletin says: Apples—One of the greatest needs of the northwest is thorough organization of the fruit growers at shipping points. Fruit growers do themselves a tremendous injustice when they fail to recognize this need. The old adage, "United we stand, divided we fall," never had a better illustration than in the growing of fruit. Local organization affects many needy reforms, and result in actually higher prices. For instance, where a local association is organized on a business basis and has the proper control of its membership, it is possible to sell ahead. It is not possible to sell ahead where it is not possible to assure the buyer of definite grade and specifications. Furthermore, a local association enables the shipment of cars of straight varieties. While it is true that this exchange has found buyers for mixed cars at really remarkable prices, this year, it will be seen immediately that the shipment of mixed cars is as a general proposition very inadvisable. Take a car with from six to a dozen different varieties, containing three different grades, the bulk of the varieties in that car may be desirable in a certain market, but there will almost surely be other varieties which are undesirable, and on which the buyer will insist on a discount in order to have him from a loss. On the other hand, this same car in some other market might prove to be desirable in the opposite varieties and undesirable in the others, so in order to get top notch value for every variety shipped they should be shipped in straight cars. The same rule applies to the shipment of mixed grades; it is much better to ship fancy grades by themselves and choice grades by themselves. Choice apples find their best market in middle western and southwestern territory, and should not go to the east, where they are not wanted, and where they must be sold at a lower price. We earnestly request those to whom this bulletin goes to consider all these questions carefully and to help perfect the local organization and put it on a business basis where it will be in position to insure delivery of the fruit on board the cars in the shape which will enable us to sell it to the very highest advantage.

The general market continues active, but somewhat irregular. The demand for Spitzenbergs and very high-priced varieties is unsatisfactory. The general idea of the class of the trade which appreciates and can handle Spitzenbergs to advantage is that the price is already so high that there is no speculative margin. This fruit is usually bought for cold storage, and operators are nervous about putting much of this high-priced fruit away, and it is therefore difficult to get them interested at the prices we are asking. On the other hand, the demand in medium and low-priced varieties is brisk. Such varieties as Black Bens, Ganos, Rome Beauties, at present valuations, are wanted. Jonathans continue to be neglected and prices must be shaded in order to dispose of them, as the storage demand is supplied and the spot demand sluggish.
