

**Biggest Ocean Liner  
Will Be Launched Soon.**



When the White Star line launches its new steamer Olympic late this month there will be a big splash in the water at Belfast, Ireland. The Olympic and her sister ship the Titanic will be 890 feet long and proportionately broad and will each displace 52,300 tons of sea water as they push their powerful way across the Atlantic. The traveling list on the Olympic will have 800 names on its first class roll, there will be room for 500 second class travelers, while the third cabin will have accommodations for 2,000 persons. To these must be added the crew of 800, making a total floating population of 3,900. The amount of material that goes to the formation of the hull of a great modern steamship is almost inconceivable. In the double bottom of the Olympic or the Titanic alone more than 500,000 rivets, weighing a total of 270 tons, are employed. The largest single plate employed on each vessel's side weighs four and one-fourth tons and is thirty-six feet long, and the largest single beam, supporting the decks, measures ninety-two feet in length and weighs four tons. An idea of the length of the vessels may be gathered by comparing them with the Metropolitan building's tower, the highest thing in New York. If the Olympic were set up on stern or bow alongside the big white building she would overtop it by 100 feet.

**IMPERSONATED MAN  
FOR LOVE OF GIRL**

PORTLAND, Nov. 5.—G. R. Reed, who impersonated a United States secret service officer to win the love of a girl, pleaded guilty in the United States district court today and was sentenced by Judge Bean to serve three months in the county jail. Reed smiled and went back to his cell. When Reed was arraigned his attorney said he had been guilty of no serious wrongdoing, the only advantage he had secured by his impersonation being an automobile stage trip worth \$1.50. He said he had posed as an officer for a position with a woman and with his friends.

**RELIUS  
HAVANA, Nov. 5.—A mass of human bones, believed to be the relics of Cuban refugees shot down at the order of Captain General Weyler during the Cuban revolution, after summary court martial was uncovered here today by sewer excavators.**

The bones were found in a park in the central part of the city. There was no cemetery near. The theory that it is burying ground of unfortunates who fell under "The Butcher's" orders is considered the most plausible.

**JURY INVESTIGATING  
EXPLOSION TAKES REST**

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 5.—The special grand jury investigating the Times dynamiting will hold no more hearings until next Thursday. The jury adjourned until that day and the San Francisco witnesses brought down here to testify were given permission to go to their homes. Several of them, it was stated today, will leave for San Francisco tonight.

The fifteen sticks of dynamite found under the home of Secretary Zschandner of the Merchants and Manufacturers' association, which were exhibited in the grand jury room, have been stored in an unoccupied house outside the city limits, where they will be guarded until the jury again reassembles.

**CONVICTION MAY  
DISRUPT NATL. GUARD**

DALLAS, Nov. 5.—As a result of the conviction of Sergeant J. D. Manley for manslaughter, committed when Manley bayoneted a man at the time of President Taft's visit here in 1909, the national guard of Texas faces disruption.

Captain Kinard of the Dallas company, today asked the adjutant general to muster out the entire company, saying that he cannot order his men to guard duty when they might become subject to conviction by the civil authorities for obeying military orders.

Four officers of the national guard also resigned and it is feared that the trouble will spread. Manley killed Louis Reichenstein and was sentenced to serve 99 years' imprisonment.

**GRAND PRIX TO BE  
RUN ON NOVEMBER 12**

SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 5.—All records for speed will be smashed, it is believed when the pick of the world's racing cars are sent away from the mark here on November 12 in the second annual grand prix race of America. The race will be run over 24 laps of a 17.2-16 mile course. No restrictions have been placed on manufacturers who are entering all sorts of freak cars as a result. The winner will receive \$2000 in cash; second \$2000 and third \$1000. In addition the Savannah challenge trophy, a race for lighter cars of 15 laps, and the Tiedeman trophy race for small cars, 11 laps, will be run.

**BATTLER'S FUTURE IS  
STAKED ON MORAN 90**

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—Whether Battling Nelson is given a chance to regain his lost championship title from Ad Wolgast or not will depend largely upon the showing he makes against Oweu Moran in their match before Jim Coffroth's club this month. A telegram from Wolgast has been received by Promoter Louis Blot that Wolgast will meet either of the fighters Blot selects. Blot declared today that if Moran won from the Battler he would be given the opportunity. Local fight fans pick Nelson to win, although advance indications are the betting will be about at even.

**DEMOCRATES ARE  
CLAIMING MICHIGAN**

DETROIT, Nov. 5.—The democratic state committee claims a democratic landslide for Lawton Hooper, candidate for governor. They predict he will be elected by a plurality of 25,000. The republican committee claims the election of Caborn, their candidate, by a plurality of 75,000.

**POLITICAL PRISONERS  
OF PORTUGAL RELEASED**

LISBON, Nov. 5.—Every political prisoner in Portugal was released today by order of the new administration. The sentences of all criminals were reduced one-third. This resulted in the liberation of many men and several women, who had been in the royal prisons serving short terms.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The Carstens Packing company of Tacoma and Seattle, through its representatives, today asked the interstate commerce commission to reduce freight rates on cattle and sheep from California to Washington. The packers demanded that the Southern Pacific Railroad company in Oregon and Washington, refund \$3573, which they declare represents an excess above reasonable rates.

BRANDON, Man., Nov. 5.—As far as could be ascertained today no lives were lost when the insane asylum of the Manitoba government was burned to the ground last night. One of the woman patients playing with matches she had secured in the kitchen, was responsible for the fire. There were 600 patients in the asylum at the time and great difficulty was experienced in getting them out. A number were severely injured and others badly chilled, as a snowstorm was raging at the time. Arrangements were at once made to secure the armory and convert it into a temporary asylum, but the problem of looking after the patients during the winter is a serious one, as the asylum at Selkirk is filled.
