

GRANT'S PASS HUMBLED, 14-0

With the fastest game ever played on the local field, the Medford High School football team defeated Grants Pass High School by a score of 14 to 0.

The Grants Pass team started strong for a very few downs, but the home boys soon held them for downs and started a steady walk down the field until Captain Scrogins bucked the ball over for a touchdown. Childers kicked the goal; score, 6 to 0. The boys kept up the aggressive work and time was called with the ball well down in Grants Pass' territory.

The second quarter Grants Pass rallied for a few moments, but were unable to meet the fancy plays of the home boys and soon the ball was again within striking distance and Quarterback Rader made a beautiful dropkick from the 25-yard line, adding three more to the score.

The third quarter was a scene of typical modern football and the ball swayed back and forth in Grants Pass territory most of the time. The fourth quarter the fast play continued and the Medford boys worked the forward pass for 15 and 20 yards at a time, almost getting away several times, until Captain Scrogins rounded the right end 20 yards for another touchdown, leaving the score 14 to 0. During this half Grants Pass resorted to a punting game.

To praise any one would be unjust, for they all played a good game, but some of the spectacular features were the wonderful handling of passes by Beveridge and Boswell; Burgess returning punts for big gains; Were distinguished himself at defense and passed the ball like a veteran; Childers averaged about 45 yards with his punts.

In all, the boys played a very good game and showed remarkable improvement in the last few weeks, both in team work and speed.

Great credit is due Coach S. B. Hall for his efficient work in developing a fast and snappy style of play, which is proving a puzzle to the opposing teams and promises to bring Medford High school the championship.

The officials were Sol Metzger, former coach of University of Pennsylvania and Oregon Agricultural college, referee; Blackington, formerly of O. A. C., umpire, and a gentleman recently from the University of Minnesota, field judge; Whiting of Washington university, head lineman.

OREGON TRUNK FILES SURVEY

LAKEVIEW, Or., Nov. 5.—The Oregon Trunk railway, which is building southward along the Deschutes river, has filed a survey for an east and west line in the government land office here to run from a point on Crooked river south of Madras, Crook county, to which point rails will be laid from the Columbia river by February 1, 1911, thence to a point in Harney county, near Silver Lake. The new survey will open to settlement much of the fertile lands that lie within the Lakeview land district and covers some of the finest valleys in Central and Southern Oregon.

One feature of the new survey is that it will give the people of the north end of Lake county a competing line against the Oregon Eastern, which is surveyed through Christmas lake, Edith, Horse mountain and other valleys in the north end of Lake county.

TURKEY FEARS LION AND BEAR

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 5.—Fearing the loss of a portion of her Asiatic domain, Turkey is massing troops on the Persian frontier to resist strongly an attempt on the part of Great Britain and Russia to divide Persia.

It is reported that Turkish cavalry already has invaded Persia. This report could not be confirmed.

Dispatches indicate that yesterday's battle was fought at Biris, not at Lingah, as Teheran dispatches stated. The engagement began when British marines attempted to prevent the Persians from smuggling in arms designed for use against England.

London cables state that news agencies are endeavoring to discredit the story of yesterday's battle by saying that it was fought in Baluchistan. Turkish officials, however, have advised that the fighting occurred on Persian soil.

SAYS TAFT FAVORS INITIATIVE LAW

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 5.—Determined to show if possible that the incorporation into the new Arizona constitution of initiative and referendum clauses will not affect its chances of endorsement by President Taft, Delegate Homes Wood of Yavapai county today read excerpts from a speech the president delivered at Prescott during his last western trip.

According to Woods' interpretation, the president's statements were to the effect that he would endorse the constitution, even though it contained progressive principles, if no attempts were made to introduce legislative provisions.
