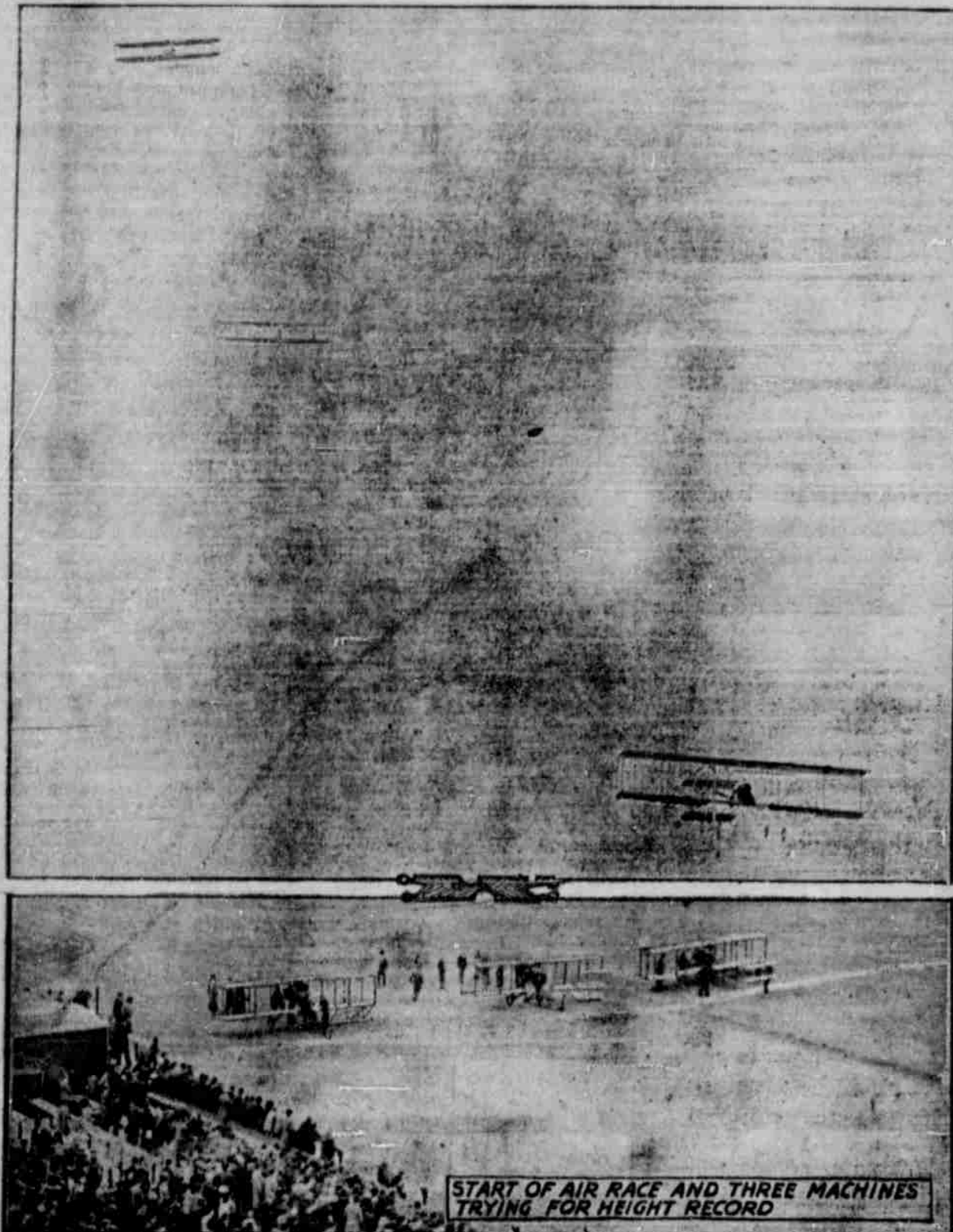


Scenes at the Famous Air Races At Belmont Park, New York City.

ELECTION DAY DELAYS STRIKE

Teamsters in New York Postpone Action Until After Balloting Is Completed—Efforts Being Made by Merchants to Arbitrate Matter.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—On account of election the proposed vote to call a general strike of the teamsters of New York and vicinity was postponed today until tomorrow. Much lobbying and secret work was in evidence about the union headquarters and the offices of the express companies today. Efforts are being made by merchants and others to bring about some sort of a settlement, if only to patch up a temporary truce. The business men hope to induce the express companies to recede from their determination to adhere to the "open shop" proposition. The strikers announced that they are willing to waive recognition of their union provided the employers will agree to arbitrate the question and will promise not to discriminate against the union men because of the strike. RAILROAD CONSTRUCTION SHUT DOWN IN CANADA

RIOT IN INDIANAPOLIS DURING ELECTION

DALLAS VOTES \$10,000 TO FINISH HIGH SCHOOL

DALLAS, Ore., Nov. 8.—An election was held in this city Saturday to determine if the new high school now being erected should be finished this year or not, the bonds originally voted not being sufficient to finish the building. By a vote of 73 for to 34 against, \$10,000 bonds were voted for finishing the school.

KISSELKAR IS WINNER OF LONG AUTO RACE

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 8.—The Kisselkar, driven by Harvey Herrick, won the Los Angeles-Phoenix race of 450 miles today, finishing at Phoenix at 11:12 a. m. today in an actual running time of 15 hours and 44 minutes. The time is 3 hours and 29 minutes faster than that of last year made by Joe Nikrent in the Buick. Fourteen cars in all were entered in the race. The Pope-Hartford finished second.

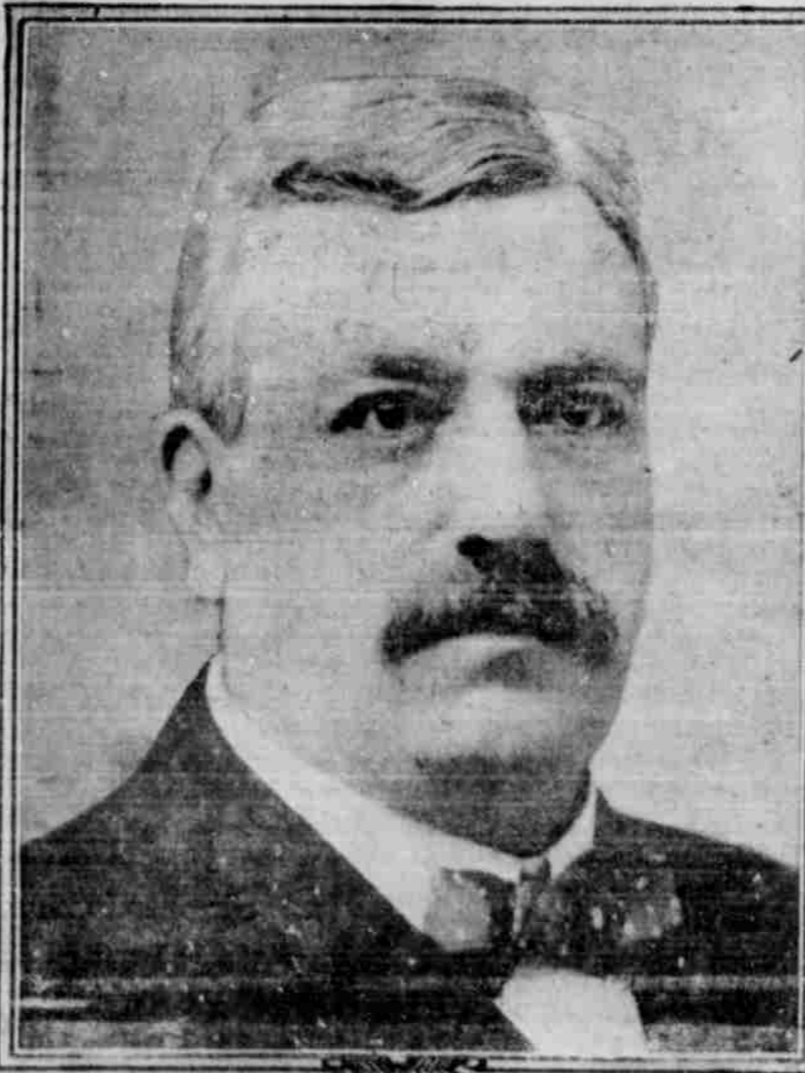
EUREKA TO COTTONWOOD SURVEY NEARLY COMPLETE

COTTONWOOD, Nov. 8.—The twenty Southern Pacific surveyors who have been working east from Goods mountain pass, on the county line between Shasta and Trinity, for the last four of five months, are now fourteen miles west of Cottonwood and one mile south of Gas Point. They are now getting their mail at this office.

Their camp is at the Bartel place. Just below the point where Roaring river empties into Cottonwood creek. They came down Roaring river with their survey, and it is presumed that they will now follow down Cottonwood creek to the town of Cottonwood, the prospective junction point of the line from Eureka and the main line of the Southern Pacific.
