### BALLINGER HELPED.

Believing that the Hill interests had not only traded worthless lands in Washington for the best of timber in Oregon federal reserves, but that the new lands had already been sold under contract to the big lumber corporations, Senator Chamberlain introduced before the senate at its last session the resolution of investigation referred to. He added at the time that it was his understanding the Hill interests had acquired 100,000 acres of timber land in one Oregon county and that this was only a small part of the holding—they had been able to acquire under the provisions of the lien land selection law.

When a big book containing records of contracts in force made its appearance after an unexplained delay of many months, the lands which the Santa Fe railroad had traded, the lands which the Aztec Land & Cattle Co. had obtained, with other lesser contracts, were stated with a lead to details which Senator Chamberlain found as confusing as it was useless. The real purpose of the resolution adopted by the senate, Senator Chamberlain said yesterday, has not yet been served. He believes Secretary of the Interior Ballinger should know of the transactions in his own department.

He believes that sincere investigation will produce the records of the Hill transactions and make it impossible for the Hill interests either to trade worthless lands for millions of dollars' worth of Oregon's best timber, or to sell this timber by contract to lumber monopolies.

"I purpose to investigate this matter thoroughly on my own account," said Senator Chamberlain yesterday. Upon my return to Washington in about a week I will have full opportunity for looking into the records. I do not propose to be misled or deceived, and I consider it of the highest importance that the way in which the railroads and lumber companies have sought to monopolize Oregon timber lands by virtue of the lien and selection laws, should be brought to light, and the lands saved to the people, if possible."
