

# FIVE DEMOCRATS TO LEGISLATURE

### Number Make Good Runs, But Lose Out—Jackson Sends Solid Republican Statement One Members

Three democrats in the house and two in the senate were elected to the legislature Tuesday. Of the 60 representatives elected, 56 are republicans, three democrats and one is in doubt. Of the 16 senators elected, 11 are republicans, and of the holdovers in the senate, Turner Oliver is the only democrat, with H. D. Norton an independent.

The democratic senators elected are: Milt A. Miller, re-elected from Linn, and C. C. McCulloch, from Baker.

Democratic representatives are: C. L. Shaw of Linn, George W. Bridgwell of Yamhill and A. J. Derby of Hood River.

A number of democratic candidates made good runs, but failed to pull through. The democratic representation in the senate will be smaller than two years ago. Organization of both branches is exclusively in the hands of the republicans. There are already a number of candidates in the field for speaker of the house and president of the senate.

## FIRE DESTROYS BIG BUILDING IN LINCOLN

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 12.—Fire started at 9:30 a. m. today in the art gallery of the Arts building of the University of Nebraska, and half an hour later it was stated that the structure was doomed to destruction. The firemen worked desperately to prevent the flames from spreading to other buildings of the institution.

The value of the building is approximately \$200,000. After a hard fight the firemen succeeded in saving the adjoining buildings and a part of the mechanics and arts building. The total damage was \$5000 without insurance.
