

### GEORGE BROWN PIONEER DEAD

Former County Commissioner and Well-Known Resident of Eagle Point Passes Away After Two Months' Illness.

News was received from Eagle Point last evening of the death, after an illness extending over two months, of George Brown, former county commissioner and a well-known pioneer of Jackson county, he having made his home in this valley continuously since the year 1862. He was born in Yorkshire, England, in 1833, removed with his parents to the State of Wisconsin when a child, grew to manhood on a farm near Rochester, Wis., and after his marriage to Miss Mary J. Tinker in 1858, and a few years spent in Wisconsin, he was induced by a brother, Henry Brown, now deceased, to remove to southern Oregon, crossing the plains with his wife and only child, the means of transportation being an ox team.

He was a carpenter by trade and followed that avocation while not engaged in mining in the Jacksonville placer district until about the year 1880. For a number of years he was incapacitated for work by stone in the bladder, for which he underwent an operation in the Lane hospital in San Francisco in 1886, afterward regaining perfect health.

Eleven children were born to him and his wife, the latter preceding him to the grave two years ago last April. All of the children but one are still living, a son having perished in 1888 from an accidental gunshot wound. With one exception, Mrs. Sarah B. Gnerin of Portland, all of his sons and daughters now reside in Jackson county, and all will attend his mortal remains to their final resting place in the Jacksonville cemetery.

Mr. Brown was a man of forceful character and throughout his career his name was a synonym for honesty and integrity, and among all the sterling pioneer element of the Rogue River valley not one has won and held the esteem and regard of his fellowmen to a greater degree than the deceased. The funeral will be held at the beautiful Evergreen cemetery at Jacksonville tomorrow (Monday) afternoon at 2 o'clock. Services only at the grave, conducted by Rev. Shields of Medford.

### Cement Sewer Pipe Best by Every Test

The following letter gives the result of experiments and tests of cement pipe in Portland, Oregon, leading city where the pipe is extensively used. CONCRETE CONSTRUCTION CO. A. P. Allen, Manager. Portland, Or., Oct. 21, 1910.—Mr. A. P. Allen—Dear Sir: Your request for an account of cement and clay pipe test held in Portland June 23 at hand. A test was made to determine the relative merits of cement pipe and clay or so-called vitrified pipe, for the benefit of the mayor, city engineer, city council and public in general at Plimpton and Ballou's plumbing shop, June 2, 1910. Three lengths of cement pipe and two lengths of clay pipe were placed under water pressure with the following results: Cement pipe stood a pressure of 72 pounds per square inch without penetration or leakage, or the entire city water pressure at that place. The cement pipe was then placed under a water pressure by using a large force pump and heels at 100 pounds pressure per square inch. To that point there was no penetration. Clay pipe was then tested at 3 pounds per square inch. The pipe leaked badly and the first pipe broke at 3 pounds and the second at 18 pounds. Pieces of cement pipe were placed in a 10 per cent solution of sulphuric acid and a 10 per cent solution of nitric acid. After being thus treated for twenty-four hours, showed no decomposition or effect of the acid in any way. Iron filings were then placed on a piece of cement pipe and sulphuric acid poured on them. The filings in no way affecting the cement pipe. The test was conducted by Mr. Seaman, a former engineer of the city, and Mr. James H. Kerr, an attorney of the firm of Carey & Kerr, Portland, Ore. The city engineer, Mr. Martin, expressed himself as greatly pleased with the test on cement pipe and recommends it highly for sewer purposes. The mayor and city council were convinced by the tests given that cement pipe was suitable for sewers, and it is now used in all parts of the city for sewer purposes. The cement pipe used in this test was made by the Portland Glazed Cement Pipe Co. of Portland, Ore. The clay pipe used in this test was made by the Oregon & Washington Sewer Pipe Co. of Portland, Ore.
