

BRIEF RESPITE FROM HARD GALE

Another Storm Is Approaching From North—Seventy-Mile Gale Sweeps North Pacific Coast—Shipping Is Damaged.

PORLTAND, Ore., Nov. 22.—With cities drenched, rivers swollen and crippled coasting vessels sunken in various harbors, the Pacific northwest is experiencing a respite today from the gales that swept over the territory for the last 56 hours. According to the weather bureau, however, indications point to the approach of another storm from the north and bureau officials predicted that storm signals would be raised at the Columbia bar this afternoon.

According to the latest reports received from various coast stations, the storm has abated in the North Pacific, though the sea is still rough and a brisk wind is blowing.

A resume of the damage done and losses sustained show that the 70-mile gale yesterday was responsible for most of the trouble.

Among the vessels that came into Oregon and Washington ports in crippled conditions was the steam schooner Temple E. Dorr.

The Dorr crawled over the Columbia bar yesterday afternoon to avoid sinking. She was loaded with 440,000 feet of lumber and was en route to San Francisco from Gray's Harbor. Part of her load was washed away.

Reports from the inland empire show that heavy rains caused various small washouts along the railroads, while in Western Washington, and Oregon flood conditions obtained in many districts.

MEDFORD TO PLAY ASHLAND THURSDAY

Medford's high school football team will play the Ashland highs for the championship of the Rogue River valley on Thanksgiving day. Ashland has played three games, winning all of them, and the Medford boys have won one and lost one of their two games played. If Medford wins this game on Thursday the team has a fine show for the championship of Southern Oregon.

The Ashland team is heavier on the line than Medford, but the fast backfield of the latter and the brilliant team work of the whole eleven will offset the lack in weight. A number of ex-eastern football stars who are ranchers in the vicinity of both towns have been putting some of the finishing touches on the elections.

CRIPPEN SEEMS RESIGNED TO DIE

States That He Believes His Wife Will Eventually Appear Alive. Thus Clearing His Name—Gallows Are Made Ready.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—Resigned to his fate, but protesting his innocence, Dr. Hawley H. Crippen spent what probably was his last day on earth in the condemned row of Bentontology today. Unless unforeseen intervention occurs, Crippen will be hanged tomorrow morning for the murder of his actress wife, Belle Elmore Crippen.

Crippen appeared resigned to his fate, and professed to believe that eventually his wife would appear alive, thus clearing his name. He emphatically denied rumors that he had confessed.

"There is nothing to confess," he repeated.

John Ellis, assistant executioner, may prepared the gallows from which Crippen will drop. Through a peep-hole he looked Crippen over to determine how far he should have to fall to break his neck, guessed his weight and then tested the rope to be used by "hanging" a bag of sand. Under the English law, Ellis is as much a prisoner as Crippen, not being allowed to leave the jail until his prisoner is hanged.

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ing which time they completely pillaged it, gathering a large supply of arms and ammunition.

After being driven out of the city the federal troops rallied, being reinforced, and returned and drove out the invaders.

Scores of Mexican refugees pouring into Laredo today are telling of skirmishes in isolated towns between local factions of revolutionists and loyalists.

These stragglers reported a battle in the town of Camargo, state of Tamaulipas, between large forces, in which many were killed. They were unable to give the result of the conflict other than that it was a bloody affair.

The report that General Bernardo Reyes is in Mexico, secretly directing the movements of the revolutionists has not been denied by the government. So far, however, no details of the operations of Reyes have been obtained.

lodging them today. The troops advanced cautiously, owing to reports that the revolutionists, aided by miners, sacked the dynamite warehouses at Parral and planted explosives at various places in the trails leading to their stronghold. Word of a battle is hourly expected, here and elsewhere.

General Terrazas today notified President Diaz that he expected an attack by insurgents upon Chihuahua, of which state he is governor. The government has commanded the telegraph lines throughout Mex-

ico in an effort to suppress reports of revolt and clashes between revolutionists and troops. This action has given rise to alarming rumors that the revolutionists have been successful and that the government forces in a dozen states are hard pressed. A report was received here that the insurgents are besieging the Gomez Palacio and Durango and that the garrison there has declared for Francisco Madero.

The revolutionary headquarters here are closely watched by United States marines and secret service agents in an effort to preserve the neutrality of the United States in the impending struggle.
