POLICE SAVE ITALIAN AND WIFE FROM MOB

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—Three union sympathizers were wounded and only the timely arrival of the police prevented a lynching today, when Vincenzo Vilano and his wife, strike-breaking garment workers, fired into a crowd that was taunting them. Vilano and his wife were backed against a wall holding off the mob with empty revolvers when the police arrived.

GARAGE WALLS TAKE TUMBLE IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 25.—Endangering the lives of a score of workmen, the roof and entire east wall of the Nease & McCarty garage at Washington and Kinz streets crumbled into the deep excavation of what is to be the basement of the H. M. Coover garage shortly before noon today. Automobiles and heavy machinery loomed in the downward rush.

A large gang of workmen were just under the wall when the first warning crack of the brick wall sent them scurrying beyond the danger zone a second before the crash. None was injured.

A. S. Ellis, owner of the wrecked garage, blames the accident to carelessness of workmen who removed the underpinning of his building and left the wall hanging on the edge of the excavation with no supports.

TAWNEY FORNIST FORTS IN THE CANAL ZONE

PANAMA, Nov. 25.—In an interview published here today, Representative Tawney, chairman of the appropriation committee of the house of representatives, is quoted as having said that he is in favor of making the Panama canal zone neutrality territory and of dispensing with fortifications. The interview quotes him as follows:

"If the nations of the world would agree to regard the Panama canal as neutrality territory there will be no need of fortifying. I am opposed to any plan or scheme for military or naval defense of the canal unless the nations of the world have an opportunity to express themselves. The United States is big enough or should be big enough, to bend all its energies to the direction of making the canal a world-wide commercial highway instead of a war measure."

NO CHILDREN TO BE ALLOWED TO WORK

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 25.—Prohibition of the employment of children under 14 years of age during public school terms will be incorporated in the constitutional law of Arizona. This was incurred today when the constitutional convention adopted a proposition providing also that no children under 16 years of age shall be employed in mines, and in no case shall children be permitted to work more than eight hours a day.

INSANE JEALOUSY LEADS TO MURDER

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 25.—William Hanning, an electrical worker who shot and killed his wife last night at Fourteenth and Columbia streets, after which he fired two bullets into his head, has a fighting chance for life, according to physicians at St. Vincent's hospital today. A postal card addressed to the woman's 15-month-old baby which was found in the man's pocket indicated that the act was premeditated.

Trading Light

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Decline in today's stock market were very light and hardly moved prices from the closing of Wednesday. General Electric was an exception and advanced 1/2. National Railway of Mexico preferred gained 1/4 on reassuring advices from Mexico. American Smelting and Pacific Mail gained a point and Northern Pacific fell 1/2 as usual.
