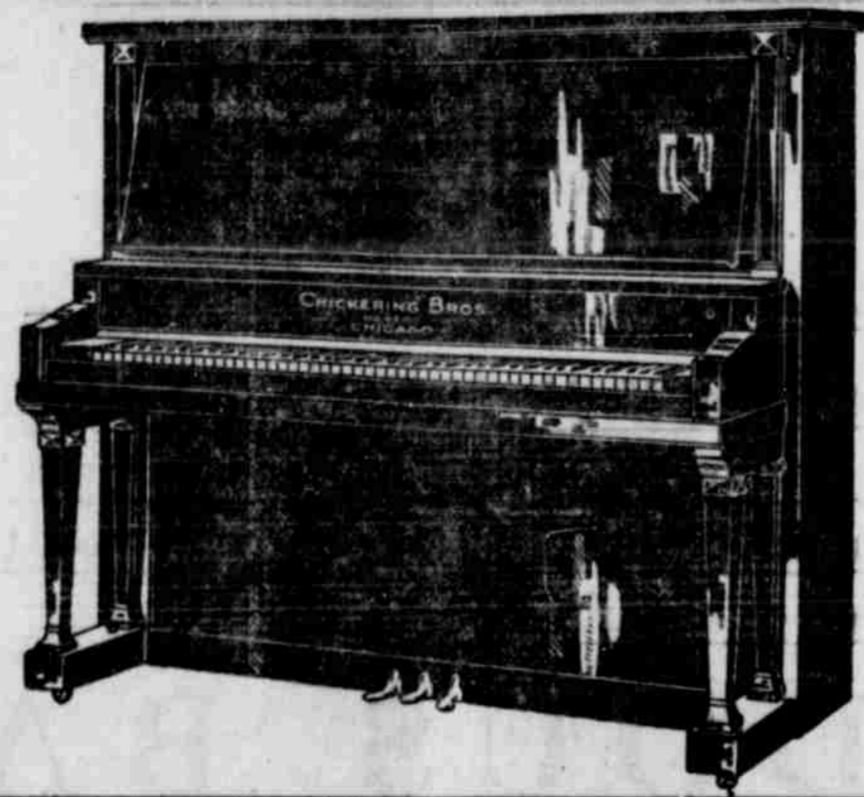

SAYS STUDENTS ARE DRUG FIENDS

Inquiry Will Be Made Into Alleged General Use of Drugs Among Students at the University of Pennsylvania.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec. 3.—An inquiry into the alleged general use of drugs among students of the University of Pennsylvania is being conducted today. The university authorities were prompted to undertake a quiet investigation following Governor Ford's charge that three-fourths of the students are addicted to the drug habit. "The use of drugs is extensive among the students, not only of the medical school, but also of all other departments of the university," said the coroner at an inquest into the death of Heffley Scott, a Denver student, who died of morphine and acetaminophen poisoning. "Most of the students do not use drugs regularly, but nearly all employ some sort of stimulant during examination time. The favorite drug is strychnine, and the students are just about full of strychnine after a week of night study in preparation for examinations."

TWO PLUNGE TO DEATH IN BIPLANE

ROME, Dec. 3.—An Italian army officer and one private were killed here this afternoon by falling from a height of 900 feet from a Farman biplane. Captain Comasota of the engineers was driving the machine. The soldier was a passenger. The motor stopped when the machine was 900 feet in the air, and the officer, apparently unfamiliar with the principles of gliding, lost control of the levers and the aeroplane dropped like a plummet. ARIZONA CONSTITUTION FRAMERS NEAR END

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 3.—Pledged to facilitate the disposition of the remaining propositions for incorporation in the new constitution, the delegates to the constitutional convention are nearing the end of their labors. They expect to conclude the unfinished business before the end of

next week, so that adjournment may be taken one week from today. The construction of the state board of equalization was fixed today. The body will be composed of the chairman of the several county boards of supervisors, according to the proposition adopted. The constitution, when completed for submission to the people of the territory, President Taft and congress, probably will contain about 12,000 words. This is a conservative estimate by a delegate. Copies probably will be ready for distribution about December 15.

PORTLAND LABOR TO SUPPORT BAY CITY

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 3.—The Central Labor council of Portland will support San Francisco in its fight for the Panama-Pacific exposition, no matter whether the fair

buildings are built under an open shop or strictly union shop principle, according to leaders today. At a meeting of the council last night the members voted almost unanimously to throw the support of organized labor to San Francisco in her fight for the fair site. The endorsement declares that the local labor body leaves the question of open or closed shop up to the citizens of San Francisco and the fair promoters.

"POWDER" VESSELS TO MINIMIZE DANGER

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3.—In order to keep the powder supply of warships at the highest point of efficiency and to minimize danger, Admiral Mason, chief of the bureau of ordnance, in his annual report, to-

day recommends the purchase of vessels to be used for the transfer and carrying of powder. The admiral declares the present system is dangerous, saying that any sort of a ship available is used as a powder-carrier. In the course of his report the admiral says that successful demonstrations have been made with the 14-inch gun that soon will be installed on the battleships New York and Texas.
