SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 3.—The women of this state will exercise their first rights of equal suffrage next Tuesday. In class elections throughout the state women may vote, according to the opinion just given by the attorney-general. In Seattle 2900 women who have registered will be privileged to vote on the \$800,000 bond issue for a water-works district.

Quake Is Recorded.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Dec. 3.—A sharp earthquake shock was felt here at 6:03 this morning. The vibrations were from southwest to northeast.

The seismograph at the Point Loma observatory registered a movement of a sixth of an inch in diameter, which experts say indicates a severe disturbance. No damage locally has been reported.

Moody Is Ill.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3.—William H. Moody, justice of the United States supreme court (retired) is critically ill at his home in Washington. His illness is aggravated by a severe cold he contracted recently at Gloucester, Mass.

Justice Moody, who is 50 years of age, was retired on full pay by special act of the last congress.
