C. C. McCord of Kentucky and B. H. Meyer of Wisconsin will be appointed to fill the vacancies on the interstate commerce commission caused by the appointment of Knapp to the commerce court and the expiration of the term of Commissioner Conkrell.

Taft's determination to recommend White instead of Charles E. Hughes for the chief justiceship came after a lengthy consultation with Attorney General Wickersham, Secretary Nagel, Secretary Knox and Secre-

tary Meyer. White is a democrat, and the nomination today is said to be the first in the history of the country in which a president has nominated to this high position a man of opposite political faith than himself.
