JACKSONVILLE HAS NEW LIFE

Progressives Square Away for New Era—Work on Water System on in Full Blast—No More "For Sale" Signs.

The fact that work is rapidly progressing on their 24,000,000 gallon reservoir and that three carloads of material including one car of the 8-inch main pipe to be laid from the reservoir to the city has arrived, the business men of Jacksonville are all a-sog and many "For Sale" signs were torn from doors on Tuesday morning and property owners began preparing for improvements of which they have denied themselves. A dozen or more citizens took down their "For Sale" signs, vowing that even the arrival of the water pipe had already advanced the value of their possessions.

The system which was ostensibly to cost \$41,000, will in all probability cost \$50,000 as many important changes in the dam at the reservoir and at the intake have already been made and many others are contemplated, which may slightly increase the cost, but will greatly increase the strength and modernize the plant.

ALL AMERICAN TEAM CHOSEN BY EXPERTS

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—In All-American eleven, based on a study of teams chosen as the best in the country by all the leading football experts is published in the forthcoming issue of Leslie's Magazine. The team picked represents the consensus of opinion of the experts.

Kilpatrick, Yale's star end, and Cozens, Pennsylvania's center, were selected for an all-star team by the great number of experts, each receiving 16 votes.

Guards—Benbrook, Michigan 12; Fisher, Harvard 11.

Quarter—Sprackling, Brown 12.

Half-backs—Wendell, Harvard 13; Pendleton, Princeton 7.

Full-back—Mercer, Pennsylvania 9.
