F. K. Spalding of Ashland, After Visiting Apple Shows in Various Sections, Tells of Great Excellence of Ashland's Exhibit.

F. K. Spalding of Ashland, after having attended all of the great national apple shows, in answer to the query, "Did it pay Ashland for the exhibit it made at the recent apple shows at Spokane and Chicago?" writes as follows:

"A number of people have asked the writer, 'Did it pay to send the car of Newtown apples to Spokane and then on to Chicago?' I say, 'Yes,' for there was no car at the Spokane show that attracted as much attention as the car of golden beauties exhibited from the A. D. Helms orchard.

"It was perfect in arrangement, pack, quality of fruit and golden in color, kissed on one side by a bluish of red. It was a grand car of apples, never had been equaled in any previous exhibit. The Hood River car of Newtowns were not as good in color or as attractive pack, but most perfect from blemishes of any kind.

"In ten boxes there were 960 apples to score, while in Ashland the pack was 120, or 1200 to score, which was an advantage to Hood River car and when we take into consideration the distance of the haul of the Ashland car, we were surprised to see so few blemishes.

"As for sweepstakes, the Spitzenberg has a lead as to variety of five points, which is a big handicap, when the scoring is so close, and this Hood River car of Spitzbergs was as near perfect as any car I have ever seen. It was grown and selected by the Hood River boosters for a winner.

"The Ashland car was the center of an admiring crowd from morning until closed for the day, and there are hundreds of people that now know where Ashland and the Rogue river valley are, and I am sure that many people will come to our valley through the advertisement this car will give us."

NEW LIABILITY LAW WORRIES

Bankers and Manufacturers in State Are Frightened by Law Passed by People at Recent State Election—Companies to Leave Field.

The new liability law passed by the people at the recent state election, which abolishes the death limit, does away with contributory negligence as a defense and provides that three-quarters of a jury may bring in a verdict for damages, is causing bankers and manufacturers throughout the state much concern, for if an employee of a concern is now injured through carelessness he can recover much more easily than heretofore from the company.

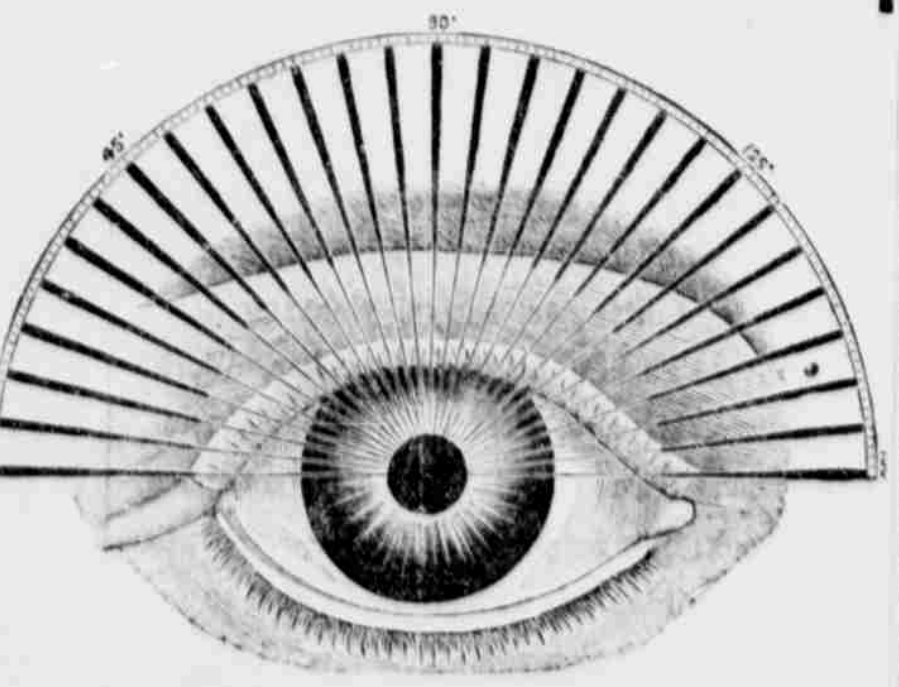

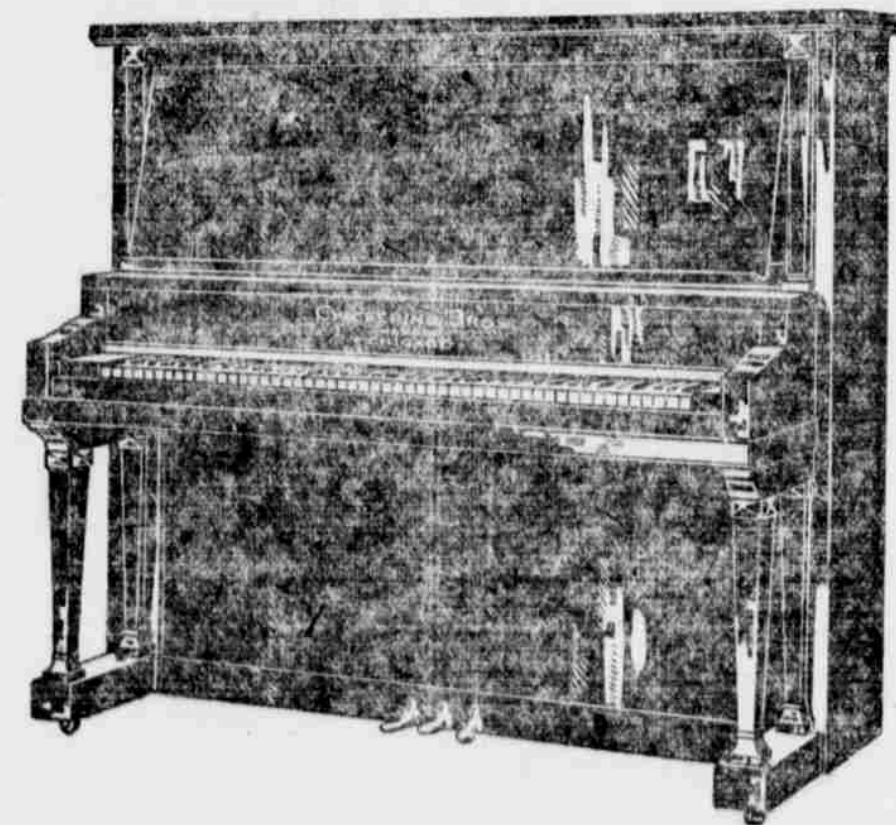
