

TETRAZZINI TO SING ON STREET

Greatest Diva of Age to Sing in San Francisco Christmas Eve in Token of Her Appreciation to Her Favorite City.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 21.—At Lotta's fountain, in the heart of San Francisco, before thousands of persons, Louisa Tetrazzini, whom Walter Damrosch has styled the greatest diva of the present age, will sing on Christmas Eve.

Tetrazzini has promised that the people of her "beloved San Francisco" shall hear her voice in the open air in a special program. A staging will be built at the fountain, presented to the city by Lotta Crabtree, the songstress who won the hearts of the men of '49. Tetrazzini will mount this structure at 9 o'clock in the evening. A number of choir boys will also appear and a special orchestra under the leadership of Paul Seindorff will accompany the singers.

The principal selection will be "Sempre Libera," from Verdi's "Traviata." This was the opera in which Tetrazzini made her first hit in San Francisco and which directed to her eyes of Impresarios of New York and of Europe. The diva will also sing the "Last Rose of Summer" and as an additional Christmas gift to San Franciscans will render "Home, Sweet Home."

Between the numbers the choir boys will sing Christmas carols.

EACH DAY IN WEEK WILL BE PAY DAY

PITTSBURG, Dec. 21.—Every day this week will be pay day for the men in the mills, mines and factories in the Pittsburgh district, and it is estimated that \$3,000,000 will be distributed to the workers in time for them to do their Christmas shopping.

For the first time in several years the Christmas pay will be much in excess of previous Yuletides. Approximately the amounts distributed in the various crafts will be: Iron and steel, \$1,250,000. Coal and coke, \$800,000. Other industries, \$700,000.

MRS GORE WITNESS BEFORE COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 21.—Mrs. Thomas P. Gore, wife of Senator Gore of Oklahoma, was the principal witness today before the house committee on Indian affairs at the hearing of the charges of Senator Gore that Jacob Hammond offered him a bribe for his vote on the confirmation of Indian lands sale contracts.

Mrs. Gore contradicted the testimony of Hammond, who declared that after the time of the alleged bribery offer he visited the Gore home and was cordially received. The witness said Hammond's reception was "very chilly."

D. W. Lawrence testified that he accompanied Hammond to Gore's office and corroborated Hammond's testimony that Gore, on that occasion, said:

"Jake, if I ever have a chance to steal anything for you, I will if you want me to."

The committee probably will continue its hearings throughout the holiday season.

WANT EXACT MEASURE PRINTED ON PACKAGES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 20.—In order to conform with the pure food laws, all the packages of foods will have to bear a statement of the exact measure of the contents on the label, if a substitute bill to be submitted to the house today by Representative Mann of Illinois becomes a law.

The substitute bill is calculated to take the place of Mann's original amendment to the pure food law. Mann decided to change his bill after a conference with Chicago and New York business men.

GERMANY IS SLIGHTED; SORE

Little Oversight of Ethics in International Code Leads to Unpleasantness—Germany Said to Be Bitter in Regard to Affair.

BERLIN, Dec. 21.—The fraternizing of English, American and French fleets with the exclusion of Germany's vessels, is said to have caused bitter feeling on the part of Germany's naval heads. The failure of the American fleet on its European tour to stop over at Wilhelmshaven, although it passed within four hours sail of that port, is regarded as an affront by some of Germany's leading naval and military men, and as thenceforward the fleet was outlined by President Faft and the heads of the navy and late departments, they are inclined to regard it as an affair between nations.

Count Reventlow, an eminent German naval expert, is one of the leaders in the anti-American faction. The count has expressed himself as bitterly angry at the alleged affront, and also has taken exception to several speeches made at public entertainments to the American fleet in England by American speakers.

TO SETTLE THAT BOUNDARY ROW

Attorney-General Bell of Washington Will Attend Conference—After Arguing Matter, Conference Will Take Trip Up River.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 21.—It was learned today that Attorney General Bell will represent Washington at the conference in Portland December 22, which has been called for the purpose of finally settling the Oregon-Washington boundary dispute. Ever since Washington attained statehood the boundary question has been subject for litigation. Governor Hay has written the governor of Oregon that he would be unable to attend as Washington's representative and that Attorney General Bell would act in his place.

After arguing the points on which they are disagreed, the representatives of the two states will take a trip down the Columbia for the purpose of viewing the sections of the river under dispute. The principal point at issue hinges on the question of which state has jurisdiction over the fishing industry at various points along the river.

No Coaching for Jones.

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 21.—Fielder Jones, the ex-leader of the famous Chicago White Sox, refused today to consider an offer to coach the Harvard baseball squad for next season.

The crimson leaders did not make a formal offer to the ex-big leaguer, but just asked him to consider an offer, and he replied in the negative.

CITY NOTICES.

ORDINANCE NO. 423.
An ordinance making the annual tax levy of the City of Medford, Oregon, and the Medford Road District for the year 1910.

The City of Medford Both Ordain as Follows:
Section 1. There shall be levied for the year 1910 the following taxes upon the assessed valuation of all the taxable property in the City of Medford, Oregon, as shown by the assessment roll for Jackson county, Oregon, for the year 1910, for the following purposes, to-wit:
For city purposes two and five-tenths mills on the dollar; for debt fund, for payment of interest on city debt, one mill on the dollar; for street and road purposes, two mills on the dollar. The levy for street and road purposes shall be levied upon all the taxable property in the City of Medford and in the Medford road district.

For general sewer purposes, one mill on the dollar; for park purposes three-tenths of a mill on the dollar; for library purposes, two-tenths of a mill on the dollar; for bridge fund, one mill on the dollar.

Section 2. It is hereby made the duty of the city recorder to certify to the county clerk of Jackson county, Oregon, the levy made by this ordinance.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon, this 14th day of December, 1910, by the following vote:
