

WANT \$13,500 ASHLAND RESERVE

Commercial Club Memorializes Congress for Appropriation to Improve Reserve in Canyon Above City.

ASHLAND, Dec. 24.—Much interest was manifested in the Commercial club at a recent meeting over the movement to secure an appropriation for the extension of roads in the forest reserve of Ashland canyon.

Memorial to Congress. Whereas, the conservation of natural resources appeals to the best judgment of thinking people, and is admitted by all to be one of the most important purposes of government advancement, and

Whereas, the construction of a proper policy to that end is a matter of first consideration, and

Whereas, among the resources to be conserved the forests and water are the prime leaders, because upon them depend to a large degree the conservation and proper use of all others; a proper conservation of the one depending upon proper fostering of the other, it goes without saying that the details essential to carry out such policy must not be neglected.

Our great water sheds are forested because the life giving element, water is there. Without the forest the water cannot be conserved and deprived of water the forests will die. The greatest enemies to the preservation of the forest are fires and the careless, greedy operations of men who have no thought or care beyond their own present selfish purposes of gain.

Recent experience has demonstrated that the greatest aid in battling with forest fires, is to make the forest accessible by roads and trails and if conservation is to be more than a pretense and a fad, sufficient funds must be available for the building of roads and trails. Such money, however, will in a large degree be wasted, unless every such road and trail shall first be carefully surveyed, so that the best grades may be established and then substantially built so as to be permanent and lasting assets. To build one trail or road this year and abandon it next year for a better route is an inexcusable waste.

Therefore we believe that sufficient appropriations should be made to secure first class and permanent results.

The Ashland Forest and Water Preserve was established in 1893, primarily for the protection of the water supply of the city of Ashland, Oregon. Since that time the rapid growth of the city and of Rogue River valley, have so increased the demand for water that every possible effort is demanded for the conservation of the water supply from Ashland creek watershed. This watershed is covered with one of the finest pine and fir forests in the world. To protect this water supply this forest must be protected.

Last summer forest fires did immense damage to the water-shed because of its inaccessibility. This would have been prevented if a good wagon road had been built from Long's lodge, a distance of 8 miles, through the center of this watershed to the summit of the mountain near Mt. Ashland. CONTRACT SYSTEM OF VOTE BUYING

Grand Jury Adjourns After Finding Indictments Against 653 Persons in Ohio—Politicians Paying Fines for Poorer Ones.

WEST UNION, Ohio, Dec. 24.—The investigation into the election scandals revealed a contract system of vote buying. The grand jury adjourned this afternoon until next Tuesday after having returned indictments against 653 persons. It is reported that confessions have been obtained involving many of the so-called "higher ups" in the political life of the state.

Under the alleged contract system, small politicians sold the voters in wholesale lots to the party bidding highest for them.

Judge Blair declared that an instance showing that the purpose of the contractors was as follows: "One of the contractors would go to the party leaders and say, 'We have seven men; what will you give?'"

"Seven men would bring \$70 in the open vote market. Sixty dollars was divided among the purchased voters and the contractor kept \$10 as commission. Men were sold like cattle."

I would say that half the voters in Adams county were bought and sold."

Wherever convictions have been secured the court is fining the defendants the amount each received or his vote.

In the cases of poor men the politicians are paying the fines.

State shows that a 10 per cent grade could be had and a road suitable for wagon traffic could be built over this 10 miles including survey at a cost of \$13,500. A mere bagatelle when compared with the loss of last summer's fires in the destruction of the forest there and the damage done to the water-supply for years to come, by the burning of a heavy forest floor which has heretofore acted as a great reservoir, retaining great quantities of water, which was thus conserved for use through the dry season. Had such a road been there with a few lateral trails, this damage would have been reduced to a minimum, if indeed it were not wholly prevented.

A conservation of the great Crater forest reserve is at no other point of so serious importance, as in this portion which is designated by the "Ashland Forest and Water Preserve" withdrawal order of 1893.

We believe that an appropriation of not less than \$13,500 should be made by the government for the construction of this road, and that such an expenditure would be in the interest of economy, cheaper than fighting fires, to say nothing of the loss by such destructive conflagrations.

Therefore be it resolved? First—That this document be unanimitously declared by the Ashland Commercial club as its earnest petition for such an appropriation of \$13,500 to be employed in the survey and construction of a wagon road from Long's lodge, in the Ashland creek canyon, Jackson county, Oregon, to the summit of the mountain near Mount Ashland.

Second—That a copy of this document be sent to the proper officers of the forestry service, through the hands of Mr. M. L. Erickson, supervisor, that a copy be sent to each of Oregon's United States senators and members in congress, and that a copy be sent to Hon. J. N. Teal, president of the Oregon conservation commission at Portland, Ore.

Third—That we ask the co-operation of the cities, towns and commercial bodies of Rogue River valley.
