

MEDFORD CATS PRIZEWINNER

Mrs. Paul Jarney Exhibits Her Blue Blood Felines—Many Blue Ribbons Are Annexed, as Well as Medals, Cups, Etc.

Medford has come to the front again and this time it is in a new line, for at the cat show which was held in Seattle last week three medals and nine ribbons (three of which were blue ribbons) were won by cats which are owned and exhibited by the Westover battery.

Out of the 175 cats exhibited "Flying Fox," a beautiful Angora, was considered the "best cat in the show," and won two medals and seven ribbons (two of which were blue). He also received wins on three silver cups—(takes winnings from three exhibits to claim a cup—besides winning first place in the three classes in which he was exhibited—novice, open and winner classes).

There is no other cat of the color of Flying Fox west of Chicago, and there is no cat from the same family west of New York. This is the first time he has been entered in an exhibit and he will enter all the shows on the coast.

Amaro, another Angora, won two ribbons (one blue) and a silver medal. Mrs. Paul Jarney—nee Spink—is the owner of the cats and as she was unable to attend the show, sent the cats in charge of Mrs. Howard of Portland.

Mrs. Jarney will be judge of the cat show in Portland next month.

WILL SPEND HIS XMAS IN ILLINOIS PRISON

CHICAGO, Dec. 24.—Former Police Inspector Edward McCann, convicted of taking money for police protection of vice in the West Side district over which he presided, will spend his Christmas in the state prison at Joliet. McCann surrendered to the sheriff today and was locked in the county jail. Tonight he will be taken to Joliet and entered in the prison tomorrow.

An appeal to the federal court will be made after McCann begins serving his five year sentence.

KLAMATH SALOONS TO BE HARD HIT

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Dec. 24.—A very strict saloon license ordinance was considered by the council at last night's meeting. It provides that there be no screens before the doors, no frosted windows and no private boxes.

The license will probably cost \$2500 a year. No official action was taken on the ordinance last night.

The council also ordered the police to close the Red Sleeve dairy, owned by John Robin, on the report of Health Officer Hamilton, who declares that the place is filthy and it is impossible for clean milk to be delivered from the place.
