Willamette University Boys to Appear at Theater Tonight—Eighteen of 'Em, Every One a Star—Many Humorous Stunts on Program.

Eighteen jolly college fellows, fresh from their haunts at Willamette university, will appear in this city tonight at the Medford theatre for one night only and sing one of the jolliest, sweetest, and most touching college songs ever heard. Beginning with "An Ode to Willamette," written by Perry Reigelman with music by Dean Mendenhall, and then swinging into a rousing college lyric, it ends with a strain that brings tears to every fellow who ever spent any time at all in college. The club sang this song last year and it made a great hit everywhere. This song is one of the features of the program and always takes, especially so with men who have been away from their alma mater for any length of time, as it takes them back again to their college days.

USES GUN TO FIND LIL' ARTH

Black Champion's Chauffeur Goes Through House With Revolver in Search for Former Boss—Terrorizes Family and Is Arrested.

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 27.—Jack Johnson appeared in police court to assist in delivering a legal knockout to Gaston Lefait, arrested for terrorizing the Johnson household with a revolver. Jack don't like the pistol sort of dispute. He admitted as much when he appeared as prosecuting witness against Lefait, who was formerly his chauffeur.

According to the story told by Johnson, Lefait called at Jack's residence last night and asked for the champion. He was told that the head of the house was not at home. The answer, according to Johnson, did not satisfy his former driver. Lefait, it is alleged, drew a revolver and with this as a passport started on a voyage of discovery through the house. Followed at long range by members of the household who repeated the assertion that Jack was "not in," Lefait is said to have gone from one end of the house to the other, looking into every room, poking about in closets and searching every place where the champion might be concealed.

It was not until he had finally inspected the kitchen that Lefait was satisfied that Johnson was not in the house, and departed. He did not say, according to Johnson, why he had called. Jack was evidently greatly disturbed over the incident.

CLEMENTS TO SUCCEED KNAPP AS CHAIRMAN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 27.—That Judson C. Clements of Georgia will be chosen chairman of the interstate commerce commission is believed to be virtually certain today. The commissioners will meet January 8 to select a successor to the chairmanship, which will be vacated by the first of the year by Martin A. Knapp, who has been appointed a member of the new court of commerce. Clements is one of the oldest members of the commission in point of service.

STOLE VOTES JUST BOUGHT

County Poor Farm Inmates in Ohio Paid \$5 to Vote Republican, Kidnaped by Democrats and Paid \$10 for Their Ballots.

WEST UNION, Ohio, Dec. 27.—Charges that votes purchased by one party were stolen by another before they could be cast, were made to Judge Blair today during the hearing of indictments growing out of the alleged election frauds in Adams county. Officers from the county infirmary who had been paid \$5 to vote the republican ticket were kidnaped and given \$10 to vote the democratic ticket, it was alleged.

The voters from the infirmary who are alleged to have participated in the deal already are under indictment and their cases were scheduled to be called. They face a disfranchisement of five years and a fine of the amounts they are said to have accepted for their votes.

Seven hundred and ninety-eight indictments all told have been returned the investigation was started. One hundred additional true bills are expected late today.

GOES TO CHINA TO RUN HOSPITAL

For having a deer in his possession, Irving Ray, who resides 40 miles up Evans creek from Woodville, paid a fine of \$100 to Justice of the Peace Wertz. He was arrested by George Lord, game warden.

DAIRY FARMERS ARE WANTED IN WASHINGTON

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 27.—Districts in eastern Washington and Oregon, north and central Idaho, western Montana and southeastern British Columbia will make determined efforts early next year to induce dairy farmers to locate in the various communities, which are now sending more than \$14,000,000 annually to outside states for dairy products. W. J. Langdon, president of the Washington State Dairymen's association, estimates there are 195,000 dairy cows in the state; David Brown, president of the Hazelwood company of Spokane, says there is need for 500,000 cows in the district, adding that his company alone would buy the output of 100,000. He added that there are hundreds of thousands of acres of cut-over timber lands in the four states and province of Canada, where ample forage can be provided at a minimum cost. The value of dairy products in the district in 1910 is placed at \$9,000,000, he continued, and it should be not less than \$25,000,000. There is no danger of overproduction and will not be for many years to come.
