

\$2.50 TOP FOR SPITZENBERGS

Various Reasons Given for Depression in Box Fruit—Cold Storage Warehouses Full—Inferior Quality Received at New York Market.

Sgobel & Day write as follows under date of New York, December 21: The markets in England on box apples are as follows: Liverpool—L. Connolly & Co. cable California four-tier Newtowns at 7 d 3s to 7d 6s; Oregon Newtowns, 7d 6s to 7d 9s; Washington Newtowns 7d to 7d 6s, with more demand.

London—M. Isaacs & Sons cable that their market is unchanged on Watsonville Newtowns, which continue to sell from 6s 6d to 6s 9d.

The continued low prices in England on box apples are owing to the excessive arrivals, because the markets on barrel apples on moderate arrivals continue to advance and the English markets are doing exactly what the different markets in the United States are doing, and for which it is really difficult to get a true explanation.

The offerings at auction here this week have been as follows: Monday—Hood River: Walbridge, \$1.30; Salome, \$1.25; Seek No Further, \$1.25; Vandever, \$1.25; Russets, \$1.05; Pearmain, \$1.20; Klickitat, \$1.25; Aiken Red, \$1.35.

Wednesday—Sebastopol: Baldwin's, \$1.45; Wagners, \$1.30; Rome Beauty, \$1.50.

At private sale on the Erie wharf Monday, 24 cars; Tuesday, 6, and Wednesday, 2, and the quotations for a good grade of apples are as follows: Rome Beauty, \$1.75-\$2.00; Gano and Black Ben, \$1.62½-1.75; Spitzenberg, \$1.75-2.25; Newtown Pippin, \$1.50-2.00; Black Twig, \$1.62½-1.75; Stayman Winesap, \$1.50-1.75; Winesap, \$2-2.25.

Above figures do not include cars of ordinary grades; in fact, we might call them stuff which never should be sent to New York, and they sell all the way from \$1.25 to \$1.75 per box; \$2.25 is the top market value for the finest Spitzenberg and Newtowns are more than difficult to sell. Very few Winesaps have been offered.

There are very few cars left in the Erie yards, and hardly any reported in transit, but our cold storage warehouses are full of box apples which must be sold some time. Dozens of reasons are given by different men for the depression here in box apples and it is generally said there are too many of them, mostly poor keepers, owing probably to the weather earlier in the northwest; prices too high in the past, and they must come down; useless speculating to put away owing to the immense quantities already stored; barrel apples are very fine; barrels are cheaper in proportion; too many low-grade box apples have hurt the business, etc.

LANE COUNTY APPLES BRING GOOD PRICES

EUGENE, Or., Dec. 27.—The secretary of the Eugene Fruitgrowers' association has made his report on the quantity of apples shipped from Eugene this fall. He reports that 51 carloads were sent east, bringing in a revenue of about \$25,000. The price received for the fruit was from \$1.25 to \$2.25 a box, which is as much as was received in any fruit district in the state, with the exception of Hood River and Rogue River, which communities have spent thousands of dollars advertising and making a reputation. While the price of the apples did not come up to the expectations of some of the local growers, the results have been highly satisfactory as a whole.

The apple acreage is constantly increasing in the vicinity of Eugene, many landowners and farmers this year setting out thousands of trees each.

\$1500 GIFT FOR CRIPPLED GIRL

Marjorie Mahr, Whose Legs Were Cut Off by Train, Remembered by Southern Pacific Company on Christmas Day.

PORTLAND, Dec. 27.—Just by way of showing, he says, that a corporation has a soul, Major Delos E. Hall, claim agent for the Southern Pacific company, yesterday sent Marjorie Mahr a check big enough to cover all her hospital, doctor and nursing expenses and to give her \$1500 besides. The major said he is a Christmas present to the crippled chorus girl.

Miss Mahr was injured while walking across a trestle of the Southern Pacific line last summer. Before she could get off the trestle she was struck by a train, losing both legs. She lay in a hospital for weeks, but finally was able to return to the stage. She was the beneficiary of a theatrical performance last fall that netted her \$7000, so that financially she is well off.

Legally, it is said, Miss Mahr had no claims against the railroad for her injuries owing to the fact that she was walking on their right of way. The circumstances of the case were such, however, it was decided to pay all the expenses of the girl and make her a present of \$1500 as well. Miss Mahr made no attempt to sue the company, it is said.
