"Dope Congress" is Next.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—One of the most interesting conventions to be held in the coming year is the so-called "dope congress"—the congress for the international control of habit-forming drugs, the preliminaries for which are now being arranged by the government of the Netherlands. Some years ago diplomatic negotiations between China and England resulted in an agreement between the two powers, by which England agreed upon a gradual reduction of the quantities of opium exported from its Asiatic possessions into China.
