ABERDEEN, Wash., Dec. 29.—Mayor E. F. Bonn has dismissed the entire police force of the city. Chief of Police George S. ### ODESSA ROAD HID UNDER SNOW BED

**Forest Service Men Report Snow Storm Raging in Crater Lake Reserve—Svenning Leaves to Plan Future Sales for Local Office.**

Assistant Supervisor Sam Svenning of the Crater Lake national forest left Wednesday for Odessa to attend to the preliminary details of some timber sales shortly to be made in that neighborhood.

Owing to an unusually heavy snowfall during the past week the trip, which will probably keep Mr. Svenning out of the city until some time in February, will prove a hard one.

Rangers B. I. Shannon and H. G. Whitney, who returned Sunday from a trip to Odessa, reported about a trip of snow then on the higher stretches of country. As the storm was still raging when they arrived here, it is believed that Svenning will encounter some difficulty in covering the ground, as the road is completely buried.

**BIG BASEBALL MEETING IN CHICAGO IN JANUARY**

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 29.—The meeting of the American association at which it is believed the decision of baseball war or peace will be decided, will be held here in January, according to an announcement.

I have absolute confidence in Arch and his ability to manage his machine, and I will have no fear in going up with him.
