HOT SPORT GETS COLD RECEPTION

Gilly Salesman for Cold Water Percolators Given Icy Greeting by Hot Victims—Flooded Ashland With Bad Paper—In County Jail Now.

W. E. Guffie, erstwhile citizen of Atlanta, Ga., but more recently of Ashland, where he established an office and set himself up as the salesman for a new device for percolating coffee by a cold water process, was lodged in the county jail at Jacksonville this morning to await the action of the next grand jury.

The specific charge against the prisoner is that of obtaining money under false pretenses by having circulated a quantity of checks about Ashland drawn against a bank account he did not have.

No bond was set in the justice court in Ashland, with the result that the embryo financier will be forced to languish in jail until his case is disposed of by the grand jury.

McGuffie first arrived in Ashland about the middle of last December. He registered at the leading hotel there and a few days later rented offices, ostensibly for the purpose of demonstrating the merits of his cold water percolator. His subsequent speculations, however, had anything but a cooling effect on persons who had accepted his bogus checks with the result that, when he was found to have left town, a warrant for his arrest was sworn out by the proprietors of the hotel. He was arrested by the police of Portland and brought back to Ashland by Chief of Police Irwin.
