

WARNS JAMES TO STAY AWAY

Editor of The Liberator Advised by Friends to Stay Away From England — Revolutionists Resurrect Story of King's Marriage.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Friends of Edward H. James, editor of "The Liberator," the sale of which was recently suppressed in London, and whose English agent, Edward F. Mylius, now lies in Brixton jail under a charge of seditious libel, tonight received a telegram from Paris saying that James had returned there from Lisbon and intended to come here on Wednesday on behalf of Mylius. The latter's arrest was caused by an attack on King George, reviving the story of his alleged morganatic marriage.

On receipt of this news, Guy Aldred, a leader among the republicans and editor of the "Herald of Revolt," at whose house Mylius was arrested, telegraphed to James advising him not to leave Paris.

"If you come here," he wired you will certainly be arrested."

Speaking of the situation, Aldred said: "If James comes to London he will be walking into the lion's den. He can do better by staying in Paris."

"I visited Mylius in Brixton jail today. Mylius expressed the opinion that he would be kept a prisoner on demand for at least two months. "A trial at this juncture would be rather foolish, to put it mildly, as it would not be concluded until near the coronation date, when the whole facts would necessarily be published, and a great sensation would surely ensue about."

"Mylius will see Attorney Newton tomorrow. He told me that if Newton attempted to publish any apology, ascribing it to Mylius, he will repudiate it and insist that the case shall come to trial."

PAVINGSUPERINTENDENT TOWNSEND DEAD

Charles W. Townsend, local superintendent for the Clark & Henery Construction company, died this morning of intestinal trouble.

Mr. Townsend, who is survived by a widow and two children, was taken sick two weeks ago.

He underwent an operation and was said to be on the road to recovery when complications set in.

The deceased was a member of the Modern Woodmen of America and of the A. O. U. W.

The funeral will be directed by the John A. Perl company and the date will be announced later.

MAIL THIEVES WORK WHILE WATCHERS WATCH

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7.—Detectives and secret service operatives searching for the thieves who stole registered mail from a ferryboat between Oakland and San Francisco found their work complicated today by an additional theft. The detectives were called in by the postal authorities today and informed that thieves had been at work again and that another sack of mail had disappeared while it was on the boat between the ferry dock and the Oakland mole.

"REDS" IN DANGER MOB VENGEANCE

Intense Feeling Against Anarchists In London Causes Calling Out of Entire London Police Reserves—Trouble Ahead.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Intense feeling against anarchists that has been manifested since Tuesday's battle between three "reds" and the entire London police force, came to a climax today when five suspected anarchists were arraigned in the Guild Hall police court. Hours before time for court to open the crowds began to gather. By the time court was opened the entire police reserves had been called out and with difficulty the crowd was driven back.

It was feared that a lynching would be attempted, and accordingly the suspects were placed in a closed van and taken to the court room by a round about way. They were slipped through a side door and were in the dock before their presence in the vicinity was known.

Expressions of hatred toward the prisoners were openly made on all sides, but no violence was attempted.

The suspects were arrested in a raid on a house in Houndsditch last week. They are Orsip Federoff; Surka Dabor, Sara Trassjosny, Jacob Peters and Luba Midstein.

SHERIFFS, DOGS AND POSSES SEEN BANDITS

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Jan. 7.—The sheriffs of Whatcom and Skagit counties with deputies and a pack of bloodhounds and at least 100 volunteers, are scouring the foothills about Acme today searching for the two thugs who yesterday shot and killed Justice of the Peace A. A. Galbraith, and seriously wounded Manager W. B. Stevens of the Key City Logging company at Acme.

WOULD PREVENT THE START OF FOREST FIRES

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 7.—A bill in line with the forest protection policy advocated by Gifford Pinchot, providing that "slashings" must be kept under constant supervision by lumber crews until burned and that the burning process must not endanger young trees, is to be presented in the legislature. The bill is intended to prevent forest fires.
