

# UNIVERSITY CLUB FORMALLY OPENS

New Organization at Last Occupy  
Their New Quarters—Rooms  
Handsomely Furnished—Thronged  
With University Men During Af-  
ternoon and Evening.

In their handsomely fitted club-rooms in the Mail Tribune building the Rogue River University club yesterday afternoon and evening held their formal opening and during the waning hours of afternoon until late into the evening the rooms were thronged by college men who have come from nearly every university of note in the United States to make their homes in the Rogue River valley.

From this time forward the club-rooms will be open each day to club members and, judging from the enthusiasm displayed Saturday, the club will be one of the most successful of its kind in the northwest.

The clubrooms were handsomely finished and the furnishings are in accord with the color schemes, rendering the rooms pleasant to the eye. The tasteful arrangement of the rooms is due in a great degree to P. W. Hamill, chairman of the house committee. Mr. Hamill has taken a great degree of interest in the work and has carried out his plans well.

The club has about 75 members at present. The officers are: S. Vilas Beckwith, president; P. W. Hamill, vice-president; W. C. Anderson, secretary, and Earl Huntley, treasurer. The board of governors consists of these officers and A. Conro Fiero, Stanton Griffith, R. W. Northrup, W. C. Washburn and Leonard Carpenter. The house committee is composed of P. W. Hamill, chairman, James Barber and Alfred Carpenter.

## 100 MEN LOOK FOR ROBBER

One is Captured and is Dying in Hospital—Justice is Shot When He Attempts to Make an Arrest.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Jan. 7.—Charles Robinson, one of the two Acme robbers, is captured and dying in the hospital at Sedro Woolley. W. R. Stevens, victim of this man and of his pal, died last night at the same hospital from the shock of his wounds.

These are today's developments of the shooting scrape at Acme on Thursday in which A. A. Galbraith, justice of the peace, and Stevens were shot while attempting to arrest Robinson and his pal.

The second robber, said by Robinson to be Ben Lowe, is still at large and the hunt has settled down to the process of combing Skagit county for him. Over 100 men are making the search. He was last seen in Sedro Woolley.

The victim of a mistake, L. K. Hynes, who claims to be a Seattle plumber, is lying in St. Joseph's hospital in this city, shot through the stomach. He was heading his way from Seattle on the Northern Pacific train last night and at Wickersham was discovered by Deputy Sheriff Gabriel who, with others, was watching the train to intercept Lowa Gabriel told him to come off the train. Hynes coolly ignored the officer's command and was shot. He was not armed and is not believed to be the man. His injuries are not believed to be dangerous.

Robinson, a mulatto, was found in a Sedro Woolley lodging house suffering from a bullet wound in his left side, and when placed under arrest by Marshal Holman admitted that he was one of the two men who had shot Galbraith and Stevens, and that his wound had been received at the time of the pistol fight that occurred at Acme Thursday afternoon.

Robinson was suffering from loss of blood and was immediately sent to the hospital where he was operated on in an effort to locate the bullet.

Before the operation he confessed that he had shot Stevens and Galbraith when trying to escape arrest after stealing a case of shoes at Acme.

## JACKSON CO. IS FIFTH IN LIST

Assessment Figures of State Board  
of Equalization Place Jackson at  
28,901, 108.00—Corporate Figures  
Not Included in City Assessment.

The total assessed valuation of  
Jackson county, as equalized by the  
state board of tax commissioners, is  
\$28,901,108, making it the fifth  
county in the state.

According to the latest figures in  
the hands of County Clerk W. R.  
Coleman, the city of Medford, with-  
out including the corporate prop-  
erties therein contained, such as the  
Southern Pacific right of way, de-  
pot, the telegraph, telephone and  
lighting companies' holdings, shows  
an assessed valuation of \$5,825,297.

The total assessed valuation for  
the state, according to the figures of  
the board, is \$844,887,708.74. Of  
this figure Multnomah county fur-  
nishes \$309,883,199.

**KING DENIES ATTEMPT

## SOUGHT WOOD; FOUND FREEDOM

County Jail an Eveless Eden During  
Year 1910—Seven Sent to Peni-  
tentiary—Seven Inmates Now Con-  
tined There.

To the fact that not a single wom-  
an prisoner crossed the threshold of  
the county jail during the year 1910  
Jailer J. W. Wilson attributes the  
fact that that institution success-  
fully passed through the twelve  
months without having to weather a  
single tempest.

Fifty prisoners, all men, were ac-  
commodated by the sheriff, of which  
number seven were transferred from  
there to the state penitentiary at  
Salem.

Of the remaining number one was  
paroled, one was sent to the insane  
asylum, one, a boy, was sent to the  
Boys' and Girls' society in Portland,  
and one, to quote the words of the  
jail blotter, "was sent after wood  
and forgot to return."

All the rest were discharged by  
the tribunals before which their cases  
were tried.  
There are now seven inmates in  
the jail, three awaiting the action  
of the grand jury and four serving  
sentences for petty offenses.

**HUNTING PERMITS  
STILL IN DEMAND**

called upon to issue 36 hunting and  
22 fishing licenses. Shortly before  
the close of the old year, Deputy  
State Game Warden Charles Gay no-

not to attempt to get along with old  
licenses after January 1. Hence the  
rush.
