**To the Wage Workers of Medford**

I wish to remind you of the coming election of city officials, ordered by resolution by the city council on December 22d, 1910, designating that there be one councilman from each of the three wards, and a mayor to be elected, and further providing for the polling places as follows: First ward over Haskins' drug store; second ward, Hotel Nash sample room, and the Third ward, the city hall.

Said election to be held on January 10th, 1911, with polls open from 1 a. m. to 5 p. m. excepting one hour from 1 to 2 o'clock p. m.

Section 55 of the city charter provides that electors must be qualified as state voters (six months in the state) three months a resident of the city and 20 days in the ward next preceding the date of the election to be entitled to vote.

I quote the above particulars knowing that the average worker hasn't the time nor opportunity to gain this information.

The election of city officials is an important matter to you and I hope you realize it.

The socialist party is composed of working men and women of all nationalities, the movement is world wide, it has the support of some of the brightest minds of this age, it is the next step in evolution.

We are in sympathy with every working class organization seeking the peaceable and equitable division of the products of industry. We are specially in sympathy and in most

countries a part of the union movement, and as such it is not necessary for us to step down from above and declare ourselves your friend and co-worker, for we are such in theory and in fact, and if you do not realize this fact I would request that you charge yourselves with the careful study of this question and look at it not only from a personal standpoint, but also as a duty to your fellow man. Remember, that the government of your interests is yours for the intelligent assuming of the responsibility thereof.

Locally this may not seem of much importance, yet it is a departure from the past and the working out of a theory for the future.

I urgently request that you inquire into your class interests and vote as you organize. I cannot refer you to any services performed for the city and otherwise will not throw any bouquets at myself, but will leave that to my friends if they are so inclined.

If elected, I will as near as possible carry out the provisions of our city platform.

I am free from any obligations, only that of labor.

I thank you in advance for your support and I hope I will not be the only socialist to go to the city hall and that you will be able hereafter to look upon the city hall as partly yours, and not only as a place to which to pay tribute.
