

CLANTON URGES NEW FISH LAWS

Makes Suggestions In Annual Report to Governor for Laws to Curb Operations of Oregon Fishermen in Various Streams.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 11.—R. E. Clanton, state master fish warden, yesterday filed his annual report with the governor, in which he includes the following recommendations to be presented to the legislative assembly within the next few days:

Prohibit the use of seines on the coast streams of this state south of the Columbia river, with less than a six-inch stretch measure.

Make it a misdemeanor for any one to take a net, sein or other fishing appliance in a boat, or otherwise, above any deadline which is now or may hereafter be established below any fishway.

Empower the master fish warden to establish deadlines on the coast streams above which no fishing will be permitted, except with hook and line.

Enact closed-season periods for the tributaries of the Columbia river, to conform with that now in force on the main Columbia.

Close Clackamas river against fishing of any kind, with the exception of hook and line.

Authorize the fish commission board to dispose of any hatchery property that may now or will hereafter be of no further use to the department.

Provide a five-year closed season period for the hatching of lobsters in Yaquina Bay and its tributaries.

Appropriate \$20,000 for purchasing necessary lands and for salmon hatchery and maintaining salmon fish hatcheries on the coast streams of the state, south of the Columbia river. Appropriate \$15,000 for the enforcement of the initiative bill, passed at the last general election, closing Rogue river to fishing of any kind except with hook and line.

Appropriate \$15,000 for the equipment and maintenance of salmon hatcheries tributary to the Columbia river.

Appropriate \$5000 for the equipment of the Bonneville central salmon hatchery, and reimburse the carriers and packers who advanced the \$1450 for the construction of the retaining ponds at the Bonneville hatchery.

POSTED BILLS; LANDS IN JAIL

Bert Ward Is Jailed and Bailed for Alleged Violation of the Corrupt Practice Act—No Complaint Filed—May Drop Case.

Charged with violating the corrupt practices act and alleged to have posted political dodgers about the city's main streets during the early hours of Tuesday morning, Bert Ward was lodged in the city jail and later released upon \$25 bail.

The identities of the people who caused the arrest are as much of a mystery as the probable disposition of the case. No complaint had been filed in the office of District Attorney B. F. Mulkey up to noon today, and Justice of the Peace Glenn Taylor said that he had not been notified of any such arrest.

Chief of Police Shearer this morning denied having had any hand in the arrest or any knowledge of events which led up to it.

Aged Resident Dies in Oakland—Has Been a Resident of Jackson County for the Past Twenty-seven Years.

The body of Mrs. J. H. Stewart, who died this morning at Oakland, Cal., will arrive in this city Friday night. She will be buried in the I. O. O. F. cemetery, where the body of her husband, who died here four years ago, now lies.

Mrs. Stewart, who was 75 years old and a resident of this city for the last 27 years, came here from Quincy, Ill. She had been in ill health for about six weeks and the end came while she was visiting with Mrs. A. J. Weeks, her daughter, in the California city.

Besides Mrs. Weeks, she is survived by Mrs. H. M. Crowell of San Francisco and Mrs. D. R. Tell of Medford, daughters, and W. H. Stewart of Medford, a son.

The funeral arrangements will be in charge of Messrs. Weeks & McGowan and will be announced later.

SELLING GOVERNOR FOR ONE DAY ONLY

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Jan. 11.—Ben Selling was acting governor of the state of Oregon for 24 hours. When he was elected president of the senate Monday he succeeded Jay Bowerman to that position. By reason of Frank W. Benson being secretary of state and governor, pending the inauguration of Oswald West, and Benson being in California, it made the president of the senate the acting governor. Bowerman was president of the senate and acting governor until the organization Monday, when Selling was selected to fill the position. This retired Bowerman as president and at the same time deprived him of the honor of being acting governor. By Selling's election he became acting governor until the inauguration of West. This is an unusual although brief distinction, and one which could not have occurred if Benson were within the state lines of Oregon. It made Selling absolute executive of Oregon, with the power to pardon and make appointments, but he did not use his prerogative during his administration. Neither did he deliver an inaugural address.

RAIN SPOILS PLAN OF DYNAMITE GANG

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 11.—What is believed to have been an attempt to blow up County Judge Owens was frustrated by a heavy rainfall today. A dynamite bomb with fuse attached was found under a corner of Judge Owens' house by his sister. Apparently the bomb had been planted and the fuse lighted, but a spatter of rain had extinguished it.

Klamath to Publish Wide. KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Jan. 11.—At a special meeting of the Klamath chamber of commerce last night a move was launched for the raising of a \$5000 publicity fund for the present year.

An attempt will be made to raise this amount by public subscriptions, and W. P. Johnson of the Klamath Development company; E. M. Chilcote, a prominent real estate man, and C. T. Oliver, secretary of the chamber, were appointed as a committee to raise this fund.

The chapter also decided to raise the salary of the secretary and business manager, C. T. Oliver, to \$100 a month. This step was taken after it had been decided that a man would have to devote almost all of his time to the work.
