WANTS COMMISSION ONLY TO CHANGE TARIFF

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 12.—Urging the passage of a permanent tariff commission bill, President John C. Cobb, of the national tariff commission association, addressed the delegates today.

"If we desire to produce sound results," he said, "the first step is to secure a thorough knowledge of existing conditions."

"Revision should not entirely be left to the commission," President Jacob Schurman of Cornell university, who also addressed the convention.

"So many elements enter into revision of the tariff," he said, "that a commission cannot replace congress, which voices the judgment of the people. This is a fundamental question, and the findings of a tariff commission alone cannot furnish a scientific solution" and take the tariff out of politics."
