### SAYS MRS. TRASK AGREED TO "CUT"

Sheriff W. A. Jones Answers Charges of Mrs. Alice Trask—Deputy Sheriff Manning Paid Woman Her Share, He Says, but Wants More.

That Mrs. Alice Trask, who yesterday filed suit against Sheriff W. A. Jones to recover \$100, which she alleges is due her for the capture of Julian A. Mock last September, made an agreement at the time with Deputy Sheriff J. M. Manning and Jack and Jim Garvin to divide the full reward of \$350 into four equal portions is the countercharge made by Sheriff Jones in a statement this morning.

"The county offered a reward of \$250 for Mock," he said, "and I augmented that by an additional sum of \$100. When Mrs. Trask informed us of Mock's proximity I ordered Manning to get him. He took with him the two Garvin boys. "When they brought the prisoner here," he continued, "Manning told me of the agreement they had arrived at and I gave him a check for \$350. He later gave Mrs. Trask a check for \$87.50, but some time after that she returned it to him. He has the check yet and it will be given her at any time she cares to take it."

Regarding the character of Manning, Sheriff Jones stated that at Talent, where Manning is stationed, he has always borne an excellent reputation and as the sheriff put it, "when he told me of the agreement I believed him and I do still."

Normal Regents Organizing. SALEM, Or., Jan. 17.—The state board of regents of normal schools met yesterday afternoon and organized. Miss Cornelia Marvin was appointed a member of the board of regents to succeed William B. Ayer, resigned. Beyond adopting plans for the future course of procedure nothing was done.

State Superintendent Alderman offered a plan for uniting the Mouth and Independence school districts and taking in a number of the outlying school districts and making it a large observation and practice school for training teachers in actual work. It is the intention of the board to build a model state normal school to accommodate 1500 students.
