

EGGS, BUTTER AND POULTRY TAKE DROP

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—The action of New Jersey federal pure food inspectors in destroying an immense supply of "cold storage eggs" on the ground that they were unfit for human consumption, is believed to be responsible for an unprecedented drop here today in the prices of butter, eggs and poultry.

United States District Attorney Sims has instructed inspectors here to investigate food products held in cold storage and his action, following the New Jersey raids, is believed to pre-empt seizures throughout the country.

Alarmed by the activity of the United States government officials, the food trust is reported to be in a panicky condition and to have thrown on the market more than \$5,000,000 worth of the cold storage stuff. This is indicated by the fact that while fresh eggs remain here worth 50 cents per dozen, storage eggs are only 29 cents and the dealers declare that if the supply unloaded by the trust continues to grow in volume the price for the "preserved" eggs will fall still lower.

Recent reports by federal inspectors here declared that a great part of the eggs, fowl and egg preparations held in storage were "rotten, putrid and unfit for human use, containing ptomaines and other active poisons in large quantities."

It is reported that in order to dispose of the large quantities of eggs and fowl on hand the food trust is dealing their stock out in the smaller towns throughout the country, thus evading federal inspection.

POINDEXTER SURE OF ELECTION AS SENATOR

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 17.—Miles Pointexter, insurgent congressman, will be elected United States senator from Washington. There is a rumor that Pointexter will be at Olympia tonight or tomorrow to witness his election.

Two progressive measures were introduced today. One by Representative Teas of Pierce and Todd of Whitman, calls for the initiative and referendum in all state legislation, and for the recall of all state officers. This would provide for the recall of supreme court judges.

The measure of Representative Buchanan of King county and Demsey and Phipps of Spokane and Halsey of Asotin, provides simply for the initiative and referendum.

Rudkin Is Willin'

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 17.—Judge Frank H. Rudkin, who had previously been offered but had declined, today announced that he had accepted the appointment made by President Taft some time ago, as judge of the federal court of eastern Washington succeeding the late Edward Whitson.

Governor Hay, who will now be called upon to name a successor to Judge Rudkin's place on the supreme court said that he had not been officially notified and had nothing to say as to who might be named for the vacancy.

Would Be Jap Muggsy McGraw.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—With dreams of becoming the Muggsy McGraw of Mikado land, Togo S. Hamamoto, a Japanese, has obtained permission to accompany the New York Giants on their spring training trip to Marlin Springs, Texas. Hamamoto, under McGraw's tuition, aims to acquire sufficient baseball knowledge to enable him to return to Japan and coach the native teams.

TACOMA MAY RECALL MAYOR A. V. FAWCETT

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 17.—Formal charges are on file in the office of City Clerk Cashman today looking to the recall of Mayor A. V. Fawcett. The charges have been made by M. B. Stambaugh, former councilman under the old form of government, who, it is said, represents a delegation of prominent business men. The commission form of government now obtains in Tacoma.

Among the charges that Fawcett has been mayor he has shown himself to be wholly incompetent and unfit to discharge the duties of the office; that his extravagance and unbusinesslike methods, if allowed to proceed, will bring bankruptcy to the city; that the mayor has interfered with the other commissioners and attempted and has usurped their functions without warrant or authority of law.

Approximately 3300 names of registered voters will be required to call a recall election. All petitions will have to be returned to the clerk within 30 days from the date of issuance. When apprised of the filing of the petition against him Mayor Fawcett expressed surprise. He stated today that he would make no attempt to be re-elected.
