COUNTIES DIVIDED INTO 15 CLASSES

Assessment and Population to Regulate Salaries Paid to Public Officers Throughout the State, According to Bill.

STATEHOUSE, Salem, Or., Jan. 20.—One of the most important measures proposed at this session is the county salaries bill, introduced yesterday afternoon by Representative Buchanan of Douglas and Jackson.

Though they were unable to pick a vital flaw in the preceding bill, the solons of the 1909 session refused to pass it, because it was introduced late, and they feared that it might not prove so satisfactory a measure as it appeared on the surface.

Multnomah county is entirely excluded from the provisions of the bill, which divides all other counties of the state into 15 classes, according to population and assessed property valuation.

Multnomah being excluded from the provisions of the bill, no counties of the state fall under the first and second class, but provision is made for them because of the growth of population and assessed property valuation.

The bill provides that in every county the county surveyor shall receive \$7.50 a day and 10 cents a mile while engaged in the performance of his official duties.

Dr. Wells said today that there was no doubt that Morton's death was due to hardening of the arteries of the brain.

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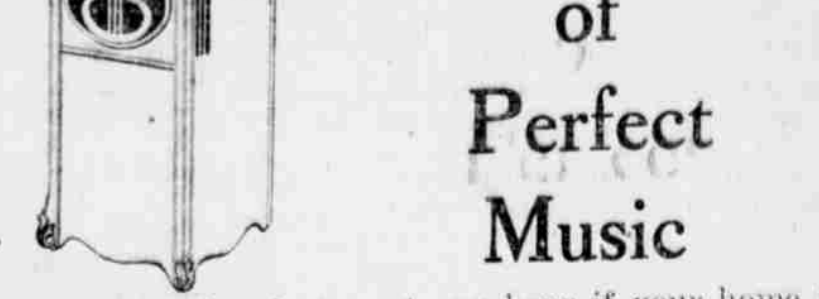
