Ex-Commissioner Dead.

OAKLAND, Cal., Jan. 21.—Walter Scott Williams, 78, once commissioner in San Francisco for British Columbia and several of the eastern Canadian provinces, is dead here today. Williams, at one time was mayor of Nananee, Ont. He came to California in 1889.

The brick and tile factory of the Gold Ray Granite company, is located on the main line of the Southern Pacific railroad at Tolo, Ore. It is a modern, up to date plant, for the manufacture of both common and pressed brick. The machinery is made by the American Clay Machinery company of Bucyrus, Ohio. The capacity of the plant is 20,000 brick, and 50,000 tile per day. There is an electric railway, one mile in length used in connection with the plant for conveying the clay. The product is equal to the best brick and tile made anywhere and is being shipped all over the state.

From 30 to 50 men are employed.

The brick and tile, as they are made, are received on a transmission belt, which conveys the manufactured product to the cars, which when loaded, are run into a dryer, from whence they are moved on the same car and placed in a kiln for burning. In this way very little handling is required, nearly all the operations being performed by machinery, thus insuring an economical and first class product. All the machinery is operated by electric power, supplied by the Rogue River Electric company. The cost of the plant to date is over \$50,000.00.
