NEW YORK NOW FAVORS FRISCO

By Overwhelming Vote Legislature Passes Concurrent Resolution Favoring Pacific Coast as Site of Exposition in 1915.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 23.—By a vote of 49 to 6 in the senate and a unanimous vote in the house, New York's legislature today adopted a concurrent resolution urging the New York congressional delegation to support San Francisco in its fight for congressional recognition of its claims for the Panama exposition in 1915.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 23.—Resolutions pledging congress that California will ask no material aid for the Panama exposition to be held at San Francisco in 1915 were passed unanimously by the senate and assembly today. As soon as Governor Johnson has reviewed one of the measures it will be telegraphed to Washington to the various California representatives for presentation to congress.

Party of Grand Forks, N. D., Business Men Making Study of Rogue River Valley—Will Remain Here Several Days.

COUNTRIES COMBINE TO CURB THE TURKS

VIENNA, Jan. 23.—Information reached the foreign office here today that Servia, Montenegro, Bulgaria, Romania and Greece have joined forces to curb Turkish aggressiveness in the Balkans. A subsidy of \$8,000,000 has been guaranteed by the Servian government to support a guerrilla warfare along the Turkish frontier, the Servian bands working in conjunction with the Montenegrins.

JOHNSON TELLS WHY HE FAVORS LEAGUE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 23.—"I

received the constitution of the National Republican Progressive league and also many letters from signers of it inviting me to join," said Governor Johnson today. "I considered the matter thoroughly and wired my desire to become a member. I look on the league as part of the republican party—a movement within the party—at least for the present.

"Its declaration of principles can be subscribed to by all voters. It is broad, simple and definite. It seeks only to return to the people the development of the nation and the state.

"I am deeply interested in the proposed work of this league. Though within the republican party, its principles should bring democrats into it. It is the up-to-date effort of the leaders of republicanism in America to bring the people into their own."

Mrs. Kvalshaug had been tried twice before, both times the jury being unable to agree.

Charles G. Newcomb has already been convicted of Kvalshaug's murder and is now under sentence of death.
