LECTURE ON MUSIC PLEASURES

Large Audience Hears One of Most Interesting Numbers of Lecture Course—Splendid Baritone With Him.

A good audience at the auditorium was highly pleased last evening by Mr. Hubbard and his two associates, Alfred Birgen, baritone, and Gordon Campbell, pianist.

Mr. Hubbard gave us a talk rather than a lecture. It was of the conversational style, which is always interesting. He gave a review of the different schools of music and dwelt particularly on the sincerity of art, which by the way, our American audience are lacking.

Mr. Hubbard is a scholarly gentleman with a most pleasing manner, and his entertainment of last evening will be remembered as one of the enjoyable events of the present lecture course. Alfred Birgen is really an excellent singer. At first he impressed one as having rather too much of

the subdued and somber quality, but later in the rendition of the prologue from "Pagliacci" he showed a resonance and vocal timbre that easily places him in the list with America's great baritones.

Mr. Campbell, the accompanist, surely deserves some mention. His accompaniment is never obtrusive. He has the happy faculty of playing under and yet supporting the voice. Good accompanists are quite as rare as great soloists. Medford will look forward with pleasure to a return date of Mr. Hubbard and his clever associates.
