CLUB NOW IS OWNER OF EXHIBIT BUILDING

John D. Olwell and the Medford Commercial club representatives signed a contract Tuesday whereby the club becomes the owner of the exhibit building after April 1, when Mr. Olwell will vacate. Five hundred dollars was paid Mr. Olwell, the remaining \$1500 to be paid on April 1. The money was raised by a syndicate of Medford real estate and business men.

By this action a long continued source of friction between the real estate agents is removed and both Mr. Olwell and those who put up the money acted for the best interests of the city as they saw them.

Mr. Olwell has maintained a creditable exhibit, at his personal expense, for over seven years, and his individual efforts have widely advertised city and valley. It was felt, however, that the city had reached proportions which justified municipal ownership and control of the exhibit.

The secretary of the Commercial club will use the building as his office after April 1 and the exhibits be maintained by the club.
