BOOKER T. TELLS OF THAT DINNER

Says Roosevelt's Action in Asking Him to Dine Had No Significance Such as Was Charged at That Time.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—The inside story of that dinner which Colonel Theodore Roosevelt gave, while

was president, which caused a big furore throughout the country, is given by Booker T. Washington, the negro educator, in the February number of "The World's Work," out today.

"In dining with President Roosevelt there was no disposition on either my part or on the part of Mr. Roosevelt to attack any southern custom, and there was absolutely no ground for the accusation published at that time that our association or our dining together was part of any pre-concocted plan," Washington declares.

Washington says that he went to the capital to discuss certain southern appropriations with Roosevelt, and found the president busy. Roosevelt suggested that Washington dine

with him and discuss the appropriation during the meal.

He adds: "Some newspapers attempted to deave into the situation a deliberate scheme by Roosevelt to lead the way in bringing about a social intermingling of the two races. I am sure that nothing was further from the president's mind, and it certainly was not in mine.

"The public interest this dinner excited seemed all the more extraordinary and unaccounted for because on previous occasions I had taken tea with Queen Victoria at Windsor Castle; had dined with the governors of nearly every state in the north, had dined in the same room with President McKinley at Chicago and had dinener with ex-President Harrison in Paris."

LORD DECIES GETS LICENSE

Gives His Age as 44 While Miss Gould, Who Is to Be His Bride, Is 18—Pays His Dollar Like any John Smith.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—With his plucking down of a hard American dollar for a marriage license at the city hall here the last legal barrier

between John De La Poer Beresford, fourth Lord Decies, and sundry other American dollars and incidentally between himself and Miss Gould is removed.

Lord Decies, with a Prince Albert suit, silk hat, cane and whiskers came to the city hall with Miss Gould in an automobile and took out his permit to wed just like any plain John Smith.

The only surprises in the declaration of Lord Decies was his age. He made it 44. Burke's peerage says he was born in Dublin 46 years ago on January 12. Miss Gould gave her age as 18.

MAIL CLERKS PLAN STRIKE

Secret Meeting Is Held in Omaha and Is Attended by 120 Clerks—Insist On Granting of Promotions.

OMAHA, Neb., Jan. 27.—Possibility of a strike of railway mail clerks on the roads centering in Omaha is seen here today in the announcement of a secret meeting of

120 clerks held last night. They wired Postmaster General Hitchcock and the Nebraska congressmen in Washington demanding that they be required to do a maximum of five hours distribution besides the hours devoted to postal studies. The clerks also insist on the granting of 125 delayed promotions, some of which have been held up for two years; ask for a per diem allowance of \$1; the abolition of certain postoffice restrictions and the establishment of guards at the doors of postoffices to bar "spotters."
