

TANGLE CLEARS IN W. VIRGINIA

Threats to Impeach Governor Fall to Ground—Matter Is at Last Adjusted—Fleeing Solons Return to Capital.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Jan. 28.—Democratic threats to impeach Governor Glascock, the republican executive of this state, through his connection with the United States senatorial tangle, fell to the ground today, when an agreement was reached between the warring parties which probably will permit of the formal election of Watson and Chilton to the United States senate. Fifteen republican state senators fled to Cincinnati to prevent the organization of the legislature, but they were induced to return by an agreement between Glascock and Chilton that the president of the senate should be republican. When they returned the republicans in the state failed to vote and, though Chilton and Watson were elected, Glascock refused to issue their credentials, threatening to call out the militia to enforce his orders if impeachment proceedings were attempted.

The mixup was apparently ended today when the Cincinnati bargain was reaffirmed.

TO INVESTIGATE ABUSE HEAPED ON JUROR

WHEELING, W. Va., Jan. 28.—Before Judge Jordan today Prosecutor Handlin protested against the abuse showered upon Juror Isaac Heyman for his refusal to acquit in the Schenk case. Handlin urged that the court punish those who have been denouncing Heyman, and Judge Jordan promised to investigate.

NAVY BILL PASSED.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 28.—A provision repealing the eight-hour law restriction on naval contracts was included in the naval appropriation bill, reported to the house this afternoon. The bill carries with it an appropriation of \$34,000,000 for naval increases in 1912, which means the continuation of the policy of building two battleships annually.
