

TENNIS CLUB TO BUY OWN COURT

Oakdale Tennis Club, at Meeting Monday Night, Resolves to Rid Self of "Lease" Bug-a-Boo—Will Buy and Operate Own Grounds.

For the second time in two years the Oakdale Tennis club has been compelled to seek new quarters owing to the fact that it is practically impossible to obtain a lease for any length of time in the vicinity of Medford.

With this fact in view it was decided at a meeting of the club held Monday night to incorporate the club with a capital of \$5000. Over half of this amount has been subscribed and the officers of the club have been assured that almost all of the total amount will be subscribed by March 1.

The club plans to purchase a tract of ground suitable in size and locality for the purposes of the club, making popular the game of tennis. It is planned to commence work as soon as suitable grounds have been secured, upon the construction of four double courts, and it is also the intention of the club to erect, as soon as possible, a clubhouse that will establish a precedent among southern Oregon clubs.

John Beeson was re-elected to the office of president of the club and E. M. Janney also succeeded himself as secretary-treasurer of the organization. William Mealy was appointed legal adviser to the club and was instructed to prepare its articles of incorporation. The membership of the club, heretofore kept at 24, will be increased so as to not exceed 50.

The committee on membership are Mr. Beeson, Mr. Janney and William McNeally. Committee on finances are James Campbell, Oryll Johnson and B. I. Shannon. The latter committee, with J. Marshall, have also been appointed to act in co-operation with the membership committee.

ABE ATTELL BREAKS AN ARM IN FIGHT

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan. 31.—Following an examination today by physicians it is feared Abe Attell's fighting days are over as a result of the fracture of his right arm received in his fight last night with Tommy Kilbane of Cleveland. The accident occurred in the fourth round. The men had been fighting at a terrific pace when they went into a clinch. Both fell to the floor with Attell underneath. Attell was rushed to a hospital, where it was found that the "funny" bone in his right arm was broken. Physicians say his arm probably will be of little use hereafter.

Kilbane was given the decision on a technicality.

BREAK IN RANKS OF DEMOCRATS

Champ Clark and 32 Other Democrats Support House Tariff Commission Bill While 91 of Them Vote Against It.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.—Champ Clark refused to make any comment today concerning the division in democratic ranks over the house tariff commission bill which was passed at midnight last night. Clark and 32 other democrats supported the bill, while 91 others voted against it. The dissenting democrats are charging the Missouri congressman with "flirting with Congressmen Payne and Dalzell" and with "billings and cooing with other protectionists." Clark declined to discuss these charges.

The insurgents voted solidly in favor of the bill.

Congressman Rucker of Missouri, commenting on the matter, said today:

"When the republican party was about to be driven to the abyss of political oblivion its champions and sponsors, Congressman Payne of New York and Congressman Dalzell of Pennsylvania were billing and cooing with a friend on this side of the house. Now they propose to take the question out of politics by authorizing the republican 'standpat' high protection president to appoint a partisan tariff board which does not intend to follow any body, but will go arm in arm with those persuasive gentlemen from New York and Pennsylvania who have had no moments of concern about our friendship for a downward revision of the tariff."

SENATOR YOUNG IS FORMINIST NEW TREATY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.—Senator Lafayette Young of Iowa this afternoon said he was opposed to any such proposition as the Canadian reciprocity treaty, and that his state was overwhelmingly against it. He contended that it would open up unlimited competition in everything that America produces and would not help anywhere. "I told Senator Cummins if he voted for the treaty he would have to go to Des Moines via Sioux City, as it would be dangerous for him to travel through Iowa," said Senator Young. "The agreement does not correct any of the ills of the consumer. If a republican administration forces the treaty upon Iowa it is apt to have drastic political effect upon the state."
