

LIQUOR CASE TO SUPREME COURT

Robert G. Smith Takes Grants Pass Puzzle to Highest Court on Appeal From Judge Calkins in Effort to Keep Town Wet.

GRANTS PASS, Feb. 1.—The test case, the State versus Hearn, has been tried before Judge Calkins in the circuit court, and the defendant was found guilty by the judge. The judge sentenced him to 15 days in jail and \$250 fine.

The parties agreed to all the facts, the defendant admitting that he sold the goods, but contended that the Home Rule amendment repealed the local option law, and therefore repealed the punishment of the crime. Robert Smith, counsel for Hearn, immediately took the necessary steps for taking the case to the supreme court for appeal, when it will be decided once and for all whether or not the local option law is in force in the city of Grants Pass.

This will be the first case to go up to the highest court on this question. If the decision of the circuit court is upheld it will mean that the people can not hold elections in cities now under the operation of the local option law before November, 1911, and possibly Grants Pass may not be permitted to vote on the question until November, 1912, because when the county is dry as a whole it is provided that no election can be held in any part of the county for two years thereafter, and the local option law passed in 1910.

If the decision of Judge Calkins is reversed Grants Pass may license saloons, but if license should be granted before the supreme court acts on it, every license will be subject to arrest, for such license will not protect the saloon men.

The liquor cases would, ordinarily have come up in April, but the test case was rushed in order to get a two months' start.

Attorney Smith's brief will be filed in a few days, and in all probability a final decision will be made early in the summer.

PORTLAND SHIPPERS LOBBYING IN SALEM

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 1.—Large delegations representing the shipping and improvement club interests of Portland were here last night to enter protest against the Malarkey public utility bill. The committees met with the senate committee on railroads and a lively session was held for over two hours.

The delegation was headed by J. Woods Smith and Ben Riesland and A. E. Clark, attorney for the public service commission league of Portland came along in the interest of the initiative bill filed by the citizens of Portland.

Malarkey's motive in presenting his measure at this time was questioned by some of the speakers, and for a time the committee room was the warmest place in the state house.

Representatives of the various public service corporations of Portland attended the committee meeting, but they were not allowed to take part in the proceedings.

WOMEN FIND MAN NOT GUILTY AS CHARGED

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 1.—Before Police Judge Arntson today six prominent Tacoma women, constituting a jury, found Karl Betschert not guilty of assault in drawing a revolver on Arthur Borchart, when Borchart chided him for not delivering a bottle of milk.

When first brought into the unaccustomed surroundings of the court room, the women jurors exhibited some nervousness, although they smiled as if enjoying the sensations. When the lawyers opened their arguments, the jurors became very attentive. A noticeable feature of the trial was that the bailiffs and court officials preserved better order and decorum than is usually the case.

Among the jurors were Mrs. John Q. Mason, vice president of the National Council of Women's Voters and Miss Esther Alstrum, food inspector of Tacoma.

INFERNAL MACHINE IS FOUND FERRY BUILDING

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 1.—Chief of Police Seymour is convinced today that the suit case found at the Ferry Building containing separate parts of an infernal machine and marked newspaper accounts of the Los Angeles Times dynamiting, was checked here by J. B. Brice, one of the three suspects in the case. Seymour points out that the infernal machine is similar to the device found under a window of General H. G. Otis' home.

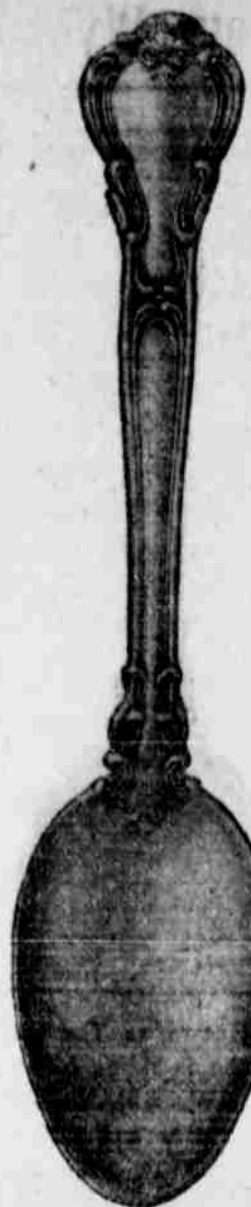
